STORK A LAZY BIRD; A FALLING IN BIRTHS

62 For Last Month as Compared With 78 in Same Month a Year Ago.

The stork was a lazy bird during the month of April. At least the statistics collected by City Clerk Baker as to the number of births recorded, shows that there was a decided falling off in the number of little citizens during the month, as compared with the same period of 1910.

Sixty-two births were recorded. Last April there were 78, a difference of 16. However, the previous months of the year are better than last year, so the season does not look unfavorable at this time. Last April was the busy party. In April, there were 45 marriages, an increase of 22 over April, 1910, or 66-2-3 per cent. This promises to be a good year for marriages.

Palmatory diseases were responsible for a large number of deaths during the month of April. Of the 73 recorded 8 were due to tuberculosis and 3 to pneumonia. The latter was responsible for the demise of several old people, and a few infants.

So far this year there have been 21 deaths from tuberculosis. This is an appalling list, and shows that the White Plague is by no means less a menace to public health than it was a few years ago. For the same period last year there were 20 deaths.

Of the deaths recorded during the month, 18 were of infants. There was no particular epidemic prevalent, the majority passing away from the usual causes. The Grim Reaper was busier than during April, 1910. In that period, only 20 deaths were recorded, while April this year showed 73.

NEW BATTLESHIP LAUNCHED.

Barrow-in-Furness, England, April 28.—The Princess Royal, the largest cruiser-battleship ever built for the British navy, was launched today, and after whom the vessel was named. The cruiser has a displacement of 26,360 tons, and turbine engines affording for a speed of 28 knots an hour. She will carry eight 13.5-inch guns, besides smaller weapons.

Maps Were Sent to Montreal for Approval of Officials There.

The C. P. R. engineers have surveyed five routes east of the city for their line which will run from the main line, connecting with McCarly and George streets, to the south end of the city.

Three of the routes laid out are near Pottersburg, while two are farther east.

It was thought that the connection was finally settled upon, but last week another route was laid out near the village of Pottersburg.

The various plans have been forwarded to Montreal, and it is expected that an answer will be received this week.

NE TEMERE DECREE WAS DENOUNCED

Sermon by Rev. A. L. G. Clarke in St. James' Church, South London.

Rev. A. L. G. Clarke, in St. James' Anglican Church, South London, last evening vigorously crossed the sword with the "ne temere" marriage decree of the Roman Catholic Church in Quebec.

"The Roman Catholic position is absolutely intolerable," he declared. "The regulation of marriage is absolutely vital to the regulation of the state. At the same time, it is the duty of the state to protect the marriage and the home, and you attack the state and loosen its very foundations. When Rome tries to force a decree like this on the people, she is striking at the very vitals of the state."

"The question that comes to us is this: By what right can she override a society to make laws binding its own members, but the society, the bylaws of which require its members to traverse the laws of the state, is a traitorous society. Every country in the world, except Austria-Hungary, Germany and Italy, which ought to be surprised at Canada submitting. We know who holds the reins of power. But even England, who for centuries has given the blood of martyrs to the cause of the state, is submitting. The Government of England is a traitor to the constitution to pieces and reforming the laws that it appears likely to let the ne temere decree go through."

"It is up to you as citizens of Ontario and Canada to support whatever step your church may decide on. Rome cannot wait."

PEACE TREATY DRAFT SUBMITTED TO BRITAIN

[Canadian Press.] London, April 29.—Harold Spender, a well-informed political correspondent of the Morning Leader, says he understands that some days ago a draft of the Anglo-American treaty proposals already agreed upon was transmitted to the British Government by James Bryce, ambassador at Washington.

MANY WAYS TO HELP LONDON

Members of the Board of Trade Put Forth Practical Ideas.

CIVIC GOVERNMENT

Colonel Garthshore Believes That the Present System Has Outlived Its Usefulness.—President Reason's Suggestions.

At the meeting of the board of trade Friday all the officers nominated at the last meeting were elected. President Dr. H. T. Reason thanked the members for the honor they had done him and in his address referred to some matters of local interest.

The militia camp, he thought, could yet be secured for this city, and steps should be taken at once to have it located here permanently.

He thought something should be done towards securing a grant for the Western University in five years the university. If asked, would have a thousand students. That would mean that the students would spend in London half a million a year, and that was well worth getting.

The board he said had been successful in getting work started for Port Stanley, and he had been advised that soundings were now being taken for the new \$250,000 breakwater, and that the work would be called for in June.

Dr. Reason said the city should do everything possible to encourage radial roads. In reference to the harbor and excursions, he reported what had been done to try and get excursions run the other way into London.

Col. Garthshore complimented Dr. Reason on the work he had done during the last year. The year, he said, had been a busy one and the greatest credit was due to the untiring efforts of the president for the large amount of work that had been accomplished.

A resolution was passed encouraging the formation of a baseball team for London in the Canadian League.

The members expressed great pleasure at the report that Secretary J. A. Nelles is continuing to improve, and the hope was generally expressed that he may soon be able to be back at his work again.

The treasurer's report showed that a balance remains on hand of \$1,208. Mr. Philip Power moved, seconded by ex-Ald. W. H. Winnett, that Messrs. Col. Garthshore, F. E. Leonard, Hon. Adam Beck and Sir John A. Macdonald be appointed a committee from the board to take up the question of electrifying the London and Port Stanley Railway. The motion carried.

City Government.

Col. Garthshore brought up the question of changing the government of the city.

"The present system," he said, "has outlived its usefulness. I think it is wrong, and should be amended, and made up-to-date. It may take months or years to devise a plan suitable for the city, but it is a matter of time before it should be appointed to look into all the progress that has been made in other cities and take up the matter of the plan for London."

The president authorized to appoint such a committee. This was seconded by Mr. C. A. Buchner, and carried.

CHARGE AGAINST E. ZORRA TEACHER

Accused of Writing Obscene Language on the Blackboard.

Woodstock, May 1.—A rather interesting and somewhat unusual case was heard in police court Saturday morning before Magistrate A. S. Ball. The plaintiff in the case were the trustees of school section No. 9 of East Zorra, and the defendant was Mr. Robert J. Carter, formerly the teacher in the school of that section.

Mr. Carter was charged with writing obscene language upon the blackboard, contrary to the school laws. Crown Attorney J. G. Wallace, who was represented by Mr. J. G. Wallace, K.C.

Two witnesses were called by the prosecution, while the defendant called the only one called for the defence.

According to the story of the plaintiffs Carter has been a teacher in the school of section No. 9, East Zorra, since the year 1905. Recently the board of trustees asked him to resign, the resignation to take effect at the end of the school year. Some days after Carter had left the school one of the trustees entered the school to assist some boys and girls to clean up, and on the blackboard were written the following words:

ten some words. According to the story of the plaintiffs the first part of the paragraph read as follows: "You will find the keys and the books in the upper left-hand drawer." Under these words was Carter's signature, and a little to one side were written some words which in the opinions of the witnesses called for the crown, were very impolite and obscene. These last words, the witnesses claimed, were written by the same person who wrote the previous sentence. They had no hesitancy in saying that in their opinion Carter wrote all the words on the board.

Under cross-examination, Messrs. John F. Wilson and John Hilburley for the crown admitted that the key for the school was left on the outside where everybody could get it, and they thought it quite possible that more than one might have entered the school during the Easter holidays.

On one occasion while the evidence was being taken, Mr. Wallace, acting for Carter, objected to Wilson making signs to Hilburley, who was in the box, and stated that he being a county constable ought to know better.

Carter, who was called for the defence, admitted that he wrote the instructions on the board telling the trustees where to find the keys, but emphatically denied that he added any obscene words to the evidence.

After hearing the evidence, Magistrate Ball adjourned the case for one week when judgment will be given.

STREET RAILWAY CO. RUSHED ITS JOB

Gang of Men Worked All Day Sunday Putting in Special Work.

The London Street Railway Company sent a busy Sunday yesterday. It was necessary to work all Saturday night, Sunday and Sunday night to put in the switches and diamonds at the corner of Richmond and Dundas streets. The task was a hard one, but the company succeeded in getting the work in place, and today the cars are running without an interruption.

Saturday afternoon Manager C. B. King had nearly 50 workmen on the job, preparing the ground. At midnight Saturday, the number was increased, and the men kept at it until they completed the task.

The property Engineer Wright and Manager C. B. King were on the job all day Sunday. Mr. King remaining until late at night overseeing the work.

Mr. King stated to The Advertiser: "The job was by no means a small one, and we were interrupted by the rain. Still we got all the steel in position, with the exception of the switch used by the Ridout line, and we can put that in any time. I was well pleased with the progress we made on Sunday, and we expect to hurry the remainder of the work through as rapidly as possible. I think we are doing first rate."

The crane built by the company at the steel work proved to be too light, and was of little use. It was necessary to use several teams of horses to pull the rails into place.
