## CAUGHT RED HANDED

White Man Was Giving Indian a Bottle of Liquor.

Sarnia, July 5.—Two men, an Indian and a white man, were arrested by Police Officer Johnson today. The Indian, whose name is White, had liquor in his possession, which was furnished by his paleface friend, named Brown. The officer was fortunate enough to catch the offenders red-handed and they were promptly taken to the police station. There is considerable traffic of this kind around here, and it is very hard to secure evidence against the guilty parties, although their names are well known. As a general rule the Indians will take thirty days in jail rather than divulge the name of the person who supplies them with liquor. Brown and White appeared before the magistrate for a hearing, and the latter was allowed his liberty, the former being remanded for a week.

It appears that he loaned the wheel to a friend last week to go to Petrolia. The friend, he alleged, pedalled to Sarnia, where he traded the bicycle to another, with whom he sold. The stolen property was recovered and the culprit will be placed under arrest.

## 100 WALKED OUT

Men Alleged to Have Been Dissatisfied With Checking System.

Sarnia, July 5.—It is reported that about a hundred men, employed by the Imperial Oil Company quit work a couple of days ago owing to dissatisfaction over the time check system in use. According to the latest report, the strikers are now all back on the job, the system having been changed. So far as can be ascertained, two checks were issued to the employees, one of which was handed in the morning, and the other at noon, and both were taken out again in the evening.

This meant quite a bit of bother for the men, who, of course, had to line up three times a day waiting their turn to put the checks in or take them out. Becoming tired of this, they demanded a change and walked out.
