London Southpaw Bumped for Nine Hits, and as a Result, He Lost His Second Game of Season—Snyder and Heck Hit Home Runs That Start Rally in the Seventh.

ERIE, Pa., June 16.—Erie came to the front with their usual number of misplays this afternoon, but despite this they sent the league leaders down to defeat by a score of 8 to 5. The Yankees muffed the horsehide at every opportunity, and in all, four misplays were checked up to their discredit, but London failed to take advantage of these bad plays. It was the sixth game the Yankees had played with London, and the second victory they had been able to grab off.

WARD'S POLO CHAMPIONSHIP WON BY THE ENGLISH TEAM

After a Desperate Struggle, They Beat Americans 4 to 2-4, and Won Polo Cup—Forty Thousand Spectators Attended the Exhibition—Enthusiasm Was at Fever Heat During Contest.

MEADOWBROOK CLUB, L. L. June 16.—The English polo cup, emblematic of the world's championship, will cross the Atlantic again, having been won today by England's team in the second game by a score of 4 to 2-4. Although the American defenders made a desperate last-ditch stand, they were not quite equal to winning. Their thrilling rushes, both individually and as a team, in the closing minutes of the struggle aroused the 40,000 spectators to a frenzy of enthusiasm, however, and no international polo struggle ever closed under such tense and exciting conditions.

Americans Lead in Final Period.
