

## ROCHE ALLOWED TIME TO OLIVER

**Payment of Royalty On Land Acquired From Tory Government Delayed.**

### FAHRNI DEAL EXPLAINED

**Government Paid in Full for Property Which Was Involved.**

[Special to The Advertiser.]  
OTTAWA, April 16.—A reply to the charges made by Hon. Dr. Roche in Parliament is made today by Hon. Frank Oliver, who was caught without voice with which to answer the attack in the House.  
Dr. Roche charged Mr. Oliver with having retained coat royalties which should have been paid to the treasury amounting to two or three thousand dollars.  
Hon. Mr. Oliver states that he acquired in 1899 the land from which the coal was taken. A Conservative Government was then in power. He supposed that he had acquired the mineral rights as well as the surface rights to the property. As owner of the property he authorized coal mining operations on it and was paid for some of the coal taken. So little was done that he never regarded the matter as of importance and it was not until he ceased to be a minister that he had discovered that he did not have the mineral rights. He applied for them and Hon. Mr. Rogers, then Minister of the Interior, granted them to him. He had found it difficult to collect royalties from the parties to whom mining rights had been let and sold.

Dr. Roche Gives Extension.  
He went to Hon. Dr. Roche and asked for an extension in making a settlement with the Government in order that he might collect the royalties due him. Dr. Roche, in view of the fact that all rentals were paid up, granted the extension of time for the settlement for royalties. Then Dr. Roche made his attack in Parliament to offset the blot, binocular and bandage scandal.

Fahrni's Transaction.  
Of the Indian lands bought by Fahrni in 1906, sold by Fahrni to J. J. Anderson, son-in-law of Mr. Oliver, in 1910, and sold by Anderson to Mr. Oliver in 1914, the Ex-Minister of the Interior says he can see nothing improper in the transaction. Fahrni got the lands in the regular way and was to pay \$25,000 to the Government for them. He made the first payment of \$5,000, and was unable to make other payments. After pressing four years for its money the Government notified Fahrni that the sale would be cancelled. To save the money he had put in, Fahrni sold the land to Mr. Oliver. Mr. Oliver bought the land from Anderson in 1910, three years after he had ceased to be a minister.

Mr. Oliver declares that in neither of these transactions did he do anything improper, that in neither was there any intention to defraud, and in neither did the Government lose anything.

Dr. Roche's declaration that his attack on Mr. Oliver was for purely political reasons has been cut out of Hansard.

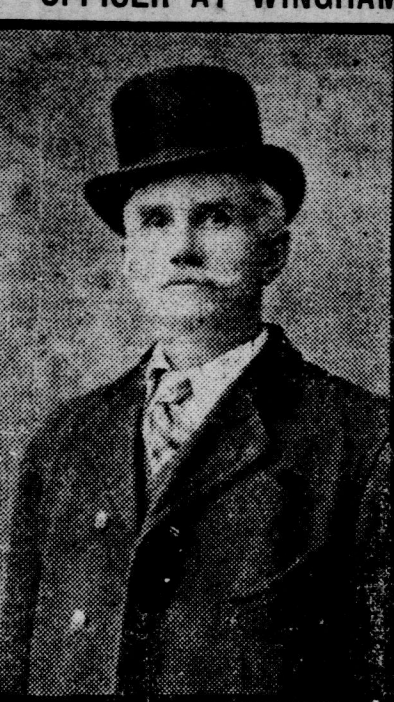

## RUSSIAN BAYONETS CAPTURE HEIGHTS

**Czar's Troops Successfully Break Through the Enemy's Wire Entanglements.**

[Canadian Press.]  
PETROGRAD, Via London, April 16.—9:45 p.m.—The official communication of the Russian War Office issued this evening says:  
"In the Carpathians our troops successfully approaching the enemy's barbed wire entanglements between the villages of Telepoch and Zulla, broke through and after a brief bayonet engagement gained possession of two heights and took numerous prisoners. The enemy sent the 121st Reserve Regiment to make a counter-attack and the fighting continued.  
"In the direction of Rostok the enemy made fruitless attacks near the village of Crosspath against the heights occupied by us.  
"Wednesday we successfully repulsed the persistent attacks by the enemy in the direction of the Strv.  
"Reports arriving from various sectors of the Carpathian front show that everywhere the roads are in a bad state owing to the thaw and the swollen rivers.  
"On the rest of the front there is no change.  
"Yesterday in the Black Sea our destroyers sank off the Anatolia coast four steamers, two of which were laden with coal and several sailing vessels and also changed fire with the Sungsudak (Asia Minor) batteries."

## AUSTRIAN STATEMENT, VIENNA, Via London, April 16.—9:20 p.m.—

The following official communication was issued today:  
"In Poland, near Biłgoraj, east of Piotrkow, a Russian attack has been repulsed.  
"On the lower Nida our artillery set fire to a Russian ammunition store, and fire trenches within effective range of our artillery were quickly evacuated by the Russians.  
"In the Carpathians isolated fighting has taken place in the wooded sectors. Advancing Russian infantry was repulsed with heavy losses. We captured 400 prisoners.  
"In the fighting in the Strv Valley we have taken an additional 268 prisoners."

## WINGHAM MAN MADE IMMIGRATION AGENT

WINGHAM, April 16.—Provincial Constable G. Phippen here received official notice from the Government at Ottawa yesterday of his appointment as agent for immigration in this district. With men, women and children, finding places for the men on farms and in other positions, and getting the women and girls into factories and domestic service. This is the fourth position he holds under the Government. He is awaiting a visit from R. W. Sloan, chief inspector of Toronto, who will give Mr. Phippen his instructions.

The Ladies' Patriotic Society recently shipped more goods for the soldiers, consisting of linen and other material for bandages.  
The members of Maitland Lodge, No. 119, met in their lodge room, at Josephine street, and after regular business sat down for a short time at a euchre party.  
A few young fishermen, who other years took pleasure in spearing, Monday, fin suckers in the river, were about to do the same this year, but were notified that it is illegal, so changed their minds.  
A Tippling recently attended the Flax Growers' Association meeting in London and the result is that about eight hundred acres were put into flax in the district this year.

## INGERSOLL COUNCIL TO INSPECT CEMENT ROADS

INGERSOLL, April 16.—The Canadian Club will have as its guest on Tuesday evening, April 27, Canon H. J. Cody, of St. Paul's Church, Toronto. Canon Cody is a native of Oxford County, having been born in the vicinity of Embro. He has a far-reaching reputation as a public speaker, and will be accorded a warm reception here.  
Members of the council will visit the towns of Milton and Brampton on Monday next to inspect Cement roads. They will make the trip on invitation of a road material company that has begun negotiations with the hope of securing the contract for the proposed improvements to Thames street. These have been on the slate for a long time, and the council is desirous of proceeding with the work as soon as possible.  
Tennis Players Organize.  
The tennis players of the town have organized for the coming season under gratifying conditions. A lively interest is being manifested in the welfare of the club, and the indications point to a material increase in the membership. The club will enter the Western Ontario League. ## GIVES HOLLAND RIGHT TO FIGHT

**Dutch Paper So Regards Torpedoing of Steamer Katwyk.**

### SUBMARINE IS BLAMED

**May Have Been Seeking Belgian Soldiers on Way to the Front.**

THE HAGUE, Via London, April 16.—10:25 p.m.—Further ministerial conferences were held today to consider the sinking of the Dutch steamer Katwyk from Baltimore to Rotterdam with a cargo of grain consigned to The Netherlands Government in the North Sea, Wednesday night. The sinking of the steamer without warning has aroused the most widespread public indignation and has called forth stinging protests from all the newspapers, even those inclined toward the German side. The papers say there appears to be no doubt but that a German submarine was guilty and the question is asked whether the captain of the German submarine was acting against specific instructions to avoid sinking neutral ships or whether the orders recently changed by Germany. One reason given for the submarine's action is the widespread report that 500 Belgians were to cross from England Wednesday en route to join the forces fighting in Belgium against the Germans. Some of these papers assume that this report was communicated to the submarine which usually is lurking in the vicinity of North Hinder Lightship and that the commander of the under-water boat torpedoed every vessel possible of striking the ship carrying the Belgians.  
It is understood, however, that the Belgians crossed safely.

INDIGNATION INTENSIFIED.  
AMSTERDAM, Via London, April 16.—9:30 p.m.—The publication here of the full details of the sinking by a German submarine in the North Sea of the Dutch steamer Katwyk, from Baltimore for Rotterdam with a cargo of grain consigned to The Netherlands Government, has intensified the indignation to which the leading papers give expression in strong language.  
The Algemeen Handelsblad denounces the sinking of the steamer as an unfriendly act giving us the full right to draw the sword and join the enemies of Germany. The paper warns the German Government that any mistake in assuming that "whatever it does, as long as German troops do not enter the territory, the Netherlands will maintain their neutrality and that any attacks against Dutch subjects or property will be endured."

## WINGHAM POLICE HAVE TWO ROBBERIES TO SIFT TO BOTTOM

**G. T. R. Ticket Office Broken Into—Suspect Taken to Belgrave.**

WINGHAM, April 16.—Chief of Police George Allen has corralled a man suspected of boldly robbing a till in the Grand Trunk station here last night. The suspect is now locked up, charged with larceny, and that any further attacks against a lively drive to Belgrave. The station till was robbed of something more than \$48, while the ticket agent was at his supper. The loss was discovered by that official when he started to make change for passengers purchasing tickets.  
It would appear that entrance to the office was gained by crawling over the wicker, as the agent found the door locked when he returned from his meal. He immediately summoned the chief. It was today learned that a suspicious character had been seen in Belgrave. The chief made a record drive and brought back the man. The prisoner when searched had only a few cents. He will appear before Magistrate A. J. Morton tomorrow.

Another robbery occurred on Wednesday night, when the novelty store of Carson & Pike on Josephine street, was broken into and a considerable amount of goods stolen.  
Entrance had been gained by smashing a large door. The tills were ransacked and much of the store's contents was strewn about.

## SIR ADAM BECK TO SAIL FOR ENGLAND

TORONTO, April 16.—Sir Adam Beck will leave Toronto the middle of next week for a brief visit in England. It is understood that he will spend about five weeks on the trip.  
It is learned that he will take opportunity of settling some important details of business in connection with the remount work, which he has had in charge for Eastern Canada.

## CORNWALL CANAL OPENS.

CORNWALL, April 16.—The first boat to lock through the Cornwall Canal this season was the Government steamer Alert. This is the earliest opening of navigation along this section of the St. Lawrence River in twelve years.

## GERMANS REPORTED FINDING BUTTER IN SUNFLOWERS

LONDON, April 16.—The production of margarine from sunflowers is the latest device attributed to the German Government to meet the expected scarcity of butter, according to a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Amsterdam. The message says that the Prussian ministry of railroads has ordered all station masters to plant sunflowers in every bit of available ground around the depots.  
Sunflowers, it is claimed, yield an oil that can be used in the manufacture of substitutes for butter.

## ROGERS TO BLOCK WINNIPEG INQUIRY

**Off West To Make Attempt—Fears Effect On the Elections.**

OTTAWA, April 16.—A majority of the Conservatives of Parliament left Ottawa convinced that the dissolution of Parliament will be announced within a few days and that June will see a general election.  
The question of dissolution will be discussed and a decision reported upon the return from the West of Hon. Robert Rogers. It is understood that Mr. Rogers is in Winnipeg trying to block the investigation into graft charges in the Provincial Legislature. It was openly declared that there had been graft to the amount of \$50,000 in connection with the erection of public buildings for which contracts were let while Hon. Mr. Rogers was a member of the Provincial Administration. Premier Roblin promised a royal commission to investigate. He has shown no disposition to make good the promise. It is stated here that Hon. Mr. Rogers does not want to have a federal campaign going on with a commission disclosing at the same time damaging evidence. If he fails to block the commission he is likely to insist that the general election be brought on immediately so that the vote can be taken before the commission gets to work.

Conservative Confidence.  
Conservative members expect that the charges against the Liberals made just before the House closed will offset the boot, bandages and binocular scandals. They are confident that the people will not vote for a change of Government until they are going home and finally they say that they have a campaign fund so large that they will be unable to spend it and that the Liberals will have practically no money. It is openly stated that in one way or another 25 seats will be bought in Quebec.  
Finally it is claimed that the soldier vote will be counted for the Government and the ballots will be assigned to ridings, where they are needed.
