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INVADE ALBANIA FROM TWO SIDES

LONDON, Nov. 2.—Albania is being invaded from the south by the Greeks, as well as from the north by the Jugoslavians, according to a message from Bari, Italy, to the London Times correspondent at Rome.

The Greek forces are variously estimated at from 1,200 to 12,000, while other troops, well armed with rifles and machine guns, have crossed the frontier and are marching up the coast.

The Greek Legion at Rome has no confirmation of the report.

EXPLAIN PARTY AIMS TO GIRLS

C. R. Somerville and Mrs. Grange Speak At Y. W. C. A. Canadian Club.

A lively interest in the issues of the present election campaign and a desire to be thoroughly informed with regard to the technicalities in connection with registration and voting were manifested Wednesday evening by the members of the Girls' Canadian Club, who piled with questions three speakers who appeared before them at "Lennore," the King street residence of the Y. W. C. A., to present the claims of Liberalism. C. R. Somerville, Liberal standard-bearer, spoke on the principles for which he is standing, answering criticisms which have been launched at all outside the so-called "National Liberal and Conservative" party.

Mrs. Grange explained what Liberalism is, telling also the story of how women obtained the vote in Canada. Charles C. Ferguson dealt with the subject of registration and voting, giving the advice: "If you want to vote, the only way is to make sure this week that your name is on the lists."

Like Balloon Sailing.
"Of all the actions of the Government," said Mr. Somerville, "the one by which it is most condemned is the fact of its present position. Like a balloon sailing, it has been thrown out all its heavy weight and filled up with lighter material in hopes of weathering the storm. Never was such a spectacle witnessed in the country as the work following the dissolving of parliament when a dozen of the heads of department were seen to be floating in the air."

ments of the Government resigned to find safe berths in the senate or in judgeships.

Hon. Edmund Bristol pretty well summed up the attitude of Meighen's supporters in the Government within the past week when he said there were still three judgeships vacant, and if they were not filled at once with Conservatives, he would resign. It looks as if he thinks the Meighen Government will not be in a position to fill such vacancies after the election.

Questions "One Policy."
With regard to the claim of Government supporters that Mr. Meighen is a man of one policy from end to end of Canada, Mr. Somerville recalled that the prime minister in his own constituency at Portage la Prairie on his own initiative offered to pool the wheat for the northwest grain growers, erecting a string of elevators and, in case there should be anyone in the audience possessing old elevators, giving assurance that these would be bought up. "The project would cost millions," said Mr. Somerville, "and it is noteworthy that Mr. Meighen never afterwards repeated that offer. If he pooled the wheat in the northwest, he should be prepared to pool the dairy and cattle trade, mining and fish trade, and in Prince Edward Island the fox trade. The thing couldn't be done for one part of the Dominion and refused to another."

Harps on One String.
"With regard to the one string continually harped on by Mr. Meighen, that of the tariff, he declares it is the one issue in the campaign. It is not Mr. Meighen who has a right to make an issue, but the people. With the national debt continuing to mount up three years after the close of the war, the increase cannot be credited now to war expenses. There is surely some accounting to be done when the national expenditure continues to be so much greater than the national income," said Mr. Somerville.

"So far as his stand on the tariff question is concerned, the only definite thing he has said about it is that he stands for protection. He didn't make the present tariff, which is founded on the Laurier-Flelding tariff of 1897. Hon. Mr. Flelding made the tariff. He never had, fair alike to all classes in the country, and under it the country enjoyed the greatest era of prosperity in its history."

Liberals Not "Wreckers."
Concerning the impolite cataloguing by the prime minister of the historic Liberal party and all others outside his own as "free traders and wreckers," the speaker reminded that the Liberal "wreckers" had been invited to join the Conservative Government in carrying the country through the stress of war. As many Liberal young men had gone overseas as Conservatives to fight, not as partisans, but for the state. "Is it fair to these Liberal young men now that they are back to term them wreckers?" was a question raised, accompanied by the comment, "If Mr. Meighen had spent half the time in seeking positions for war heroes that he has for his weak-kneed supporters who left him when he was going reluctantly to the country there would be more harmony in the country now."

In conclusion, Mr. Somerville expressed his belief that with the womanhood of the nation participating in the general politics there will be much more careful accounting and living within the national income, because of the threat of women in such matters.

Mrs. Grange described Liberalism throughout its history as a "fight for constitutional freedom," citing in-

CHARLES ON WAY OUT OF HUNGARY

BUDAPEST, Nov. 2.—Former Emperor Charles was today on his way out of Hungary to begin what appeared to be permanent exile. He and former Empress Zita left Buda yesterday for Dunafoldvar, a town on the Danube below this city, and then went on board the British gunboat Glow Worm. Arrangements have been made to land the ex-royal couple at Galatz, Rumania, a city about 100 miles from the mouth of the Danube.

INSTALL FRUIT STORAGE PLANT AT BRIGHTON

TORONTO, Nov. 2.—One of the first cold storage plants to be installed by the Ontario Department of Agriculture for the pre-cooling and storage of fruit is now in operation at Brighton, Ont. The building consists of three storage rooms fifty by sixty feet, with a capacity of ten thousand barrels of apples, also a basement capable of holding 5,000 barrels, which can be utilized at any time for cold storage as the demand warrants it.

MEMBERS OF C. B. R. E. REJECT WAGE PROPOSAL

OTTAWA, Nov. 2.—(By Canadian Press.)—Word was received by labor here today to the effect that the general committee of the Grand Trunk employees, members of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees, meeting at Toronto this morning, unanimously rejected what was termed "the so-called tentative agreement" as to wages on the Grand Trunk, which was signed at Montreal last week.

BURY MRS. CODY WITH HUSBAND

DENVER, Nov. 2.—The body of Mrs. Wm. Cody lies today in the grave with her husband, "Buffalo Bill," famous scout and Indian fighter, at the top of Lookout Mountain, near Golden, Colo. More than 100 persons yesterday attended the brief Episcopal ceremony at the mountain top overlooking the plains of Colorado.
