The number of the new field senior medical officer to proceed with ambulance unit is 11, replacing number 14 field ambulance, which was formerly in existence.

The unit will be recruited to the following strength: 10 officers, 1 sergeant-major, 16 staff sergeants and sergeants, 7 corporals and 68 privates, a total of 102 all ranks.

Major Poisson, the commander of the new unit, served four years and eight months in the late war. He left Essex County with the 14th Field Ambulance, Aug. 19, 1914, and shares the distinction, with the late Dr. Stayner Ellis, of being the first officer to leave the Border Cities for

He was wounded on the Somme after two years with the front-line troops in France, and after recovery was engaged as adjutant with units 6 and 8, Canadian General Hospital.

Dr. Poisson returned to Canada March 29, 1919, with rank as major. He holds the Military Cross, which was awarded to him following the

battle of the Somme. Major Poisson has already chosen six medical officers and one quartermaster, and will hold his first recruiting next Wednesday night at o'clock in the Armories, Windsor.
