Members of the Canada Passenger Association held their regular August meeting at Port Stanley Thursday, with more than 20 representatives of Canadian railways present. Port Stanley was selected for the August meeting on the invitation of officials of the London and Port Stanley Railway Company, and prior to leaving London Thursday night the visitors expressed themselves as delighted with the treatment accorded them at the lakeside.

Dine in Cafeteria.
The party left Port Stanley for Port Stanley via special train at 11:50 o'clock Thursday morning, and following dinner served in the L. and P. S. Cafeteria, disposed of routine business for the month. With the more serious work of the day concluded the visitors enjoyed a swim in Lake Erie, in bathing suits provided by the London and Port Stanley Railway Company.

During their stay in Port Stanley the railway representatives inspected the civic-owned enterprises, and commented very favorably on them. They returned to London via a special train early Thursday evening.

The trip to Port Stanley and return to London was made in 40 minutes by both special trains, and the Canada Passenger Association members declared that the operation, roadbed and equipment of the London and Port Stanley Railway Company proved a wonderful revelation to them.

As a result of the treatment accorded them by their hosts the delegates promised that Port Stanley will in future vie with Montreal for the choice for monthly meetings.

DETROIT, Aug. 10.—Mrs. Eva Hemm, 28 years old, 2580 Fourteenth avenue, failed in two attempts to end her life in the Detroit River late Wednesday afternoon. TORONTO, Aug. 10.—Whiskey thieves made another rich haul when fifteen cases of whiskey were stolen from the residence of Joseph Dunklema, 516 Palmerston Boulevard, while the family were on holiday.

The wet goods were stored in the garbages in the attic. The doors were locked, but when Mr. Dunklema came home he found the doors open and his stock missing. There were no marks of the doors being "jimmied."

The liquor was insured. Neighbors told the police they saw two men leaving the house late on Saturday night.

FEARS BETTING VOGUE IN HURON

Social Service Council of County Will Protest To Provincial Authorities.

Alleging Wagers Placed At Wingham Races, Ask Ban At Listowel.

CLINTON, Aug. 10.—Every possible effort will be made within the next few days by the Huron County Social Service Council, working jointly with the Wingham Social Service Council, to have the betting franchise, alleged to have been obtained by the Wingham Turf Association, for a big racing meet at Listowel, next week, cancelled. Through Crown Attorney Scobie of Goderich direct application for the resending of permission for legalized betting will be made to Attorney-General Raney.

Franchise Loaned.
Owing to the races at Hamilton not taking the full time granted to them in their franchise, their permission to hold organized betting at the race track has been loaned by them to the Wingham Turf Association. It is claimed.

It is feared betting will take place Monday at Listowel should the efforts of the reformers not avail. Two provincial officers were in Wingham Wednesday and Thursday gathering data on the question, but no action has been taken from the attorney-general's office that would indicate that it is the intention of that office to withhold the permission for gambling from the Wingham and Listowel Turf Associations.

First Time in Huron.
It is the claim of J. A. Irwin, president of the Huron County Social Service Council, that this action to allow pari-mutuel betting at the track-side is the first that has ever been granted to any racing association in the county of Huron, and he deduces therefore that it is a bad precedent that is being set.

J. A. Irwin, together with A. T. Cooper, president of the Huron County Social Service Council, are two individuals who are actively engaged in combating the proposed license to bet on the ponies.

MAY PROTEST ACTION OF FORD CITY TOWN COUNCIL

Granting Bus Franchise Expected To Cause Trouble With Hydro.

WINDSOR, Aug. 10.—The action of the Ford City Town Council in granting a franchise to a Hamilton bus line to ply between Ford and Windsor may bring down the wrath of the Hydro-Electric leaders at Toronto upon their heads.

It seems to be generally accepted that the Ford council's action violates the agreement negotiated with the border cities by Sir Adam Beck and his chief engineer, F. E. Gaby. It is understood that the agreement gives the Hydro Commission an exclusive franchise. In other words, no opposition was to be sanctioned.

The contention now is that the Ford council in making such an arrangement with the Hamilton bus line has been conceding to fly in the face of this agreement.

Supt. A. F. McGill, of the Hydro Commission, stated today that he could not give an opinion on the question for Sir Adam Beck and his fellow commissioners to deal with at Toronto. They have the agreements with the different municipalities there.

"Have the commissioners at Toronto been notified of the action of the Ford council?" Mr. McGill was asked.

"They will be today," was the reply.

FIRE PERILS WAR CAMP IN ILLINOIS

ROCKFORD, Ill., Aug. 10.—A fire which threatens complete destruction of all buildings in the heart of Camp Grant, broke out in the old base hospital area about 9 o'clock tonight, and is spreading rapidly.

All Camp Grant fire companies and half the Rockford fire department is fighting the blaze. Several men have received minor injuries and burns. Six buildings of the hospital area are now consumed, and the fire is spreading.

2 KILLED AS AIRPLANE PLUNGES INTO STREET

CHICAGO, Aug. 10.—Edward Schille, widely-known automobile driver, and Roy J. Keller, former service and automobile man, were killed tonight when an airplane, piloted by Keller, plunged into the streets of Naperville, about 30 miles from Chicago.

MOVIE STAR HIT BY MOTOR TRUCK
LOS ANGELES, Aug. 10.—Eugene O'Brien, a well-known motion picture actor, is in a critical condition at a Hollywood hospital today with internal injuries and a possible fracture of the skull as a result of having been run down by a motor truck last night while walking on a highway in the Hollywood Hills.

Arrest Motor Mechanic in Quebec
Wanted As Link in Small Mystery

MONTREAL, Aug. 10.—A dispatch received here today from Perce, Quebec, reported the arrest of Max Phillips, alias Albert King, wanted in connection with the disappearance of Ambrose J. Small, Toronto theatrical magnate, who has been missing since December 2, 1919. Phillips was arrested at a summer hotel where he was employed as an automobile mechanic.

The arrest is that sequel to the arrest of a woman in the Province of New Brunswick, who gave the police valuable information in regard to the case. The woman, whose name is withheld by the police, is at present in the police cells here.
