U. S. TOURIST TRAFFIC BROUGHT BY PUBLICITY

Americans Passing Through
Sarnia Likely To Exceed
Last Year's Record.

Sarnia, July 10.—The great new industry of American tourist traffic is mounting up daily. The season is three weeks later than last year, but thanks to the efforts of the Blue Water Highway Association and the Sarnia Chamber of Commerce, the volume of motor tourist traffic crossing at this point of entry promises to exceed the high record of more than 50,000 cars last season. Leading spirits locally have caught a splendid vision of the tourist traffic as the money to pay for their printing and promotion organization which has been tapping the rich industrial centers in the nearby states. The high province. They have risked their own motorized well-to-do population from these centers have accepted the lure of the blue water trail and the local invitations to "come to Sarnia, Ontario, the Playground of America."

The local organizations admit that they are endeavoring to entice American tourists off the main routes of travel and into the newly accessible summering places of the Bruce Peninsula, up to Owen Sound and Barrie.

The work of these pioneers in Ontario tourist traffic development is being right judged by results so far obtained on very limited expenditures. Hundreds of thousands of dollars have been returned from a few hundreds invested in this promotion. The accomplishments of British Columbia, where the tourist traffic is now the second industry of that province, and the experience of Spain and of Switzerland have been drawn on in working out the Blue Water Highway scheme.

Those who are in a position to profit from the traffic are reporting the color of the United States hard cash from the tourists to be most welcome, and they say without it business would be slack.

ORPHANS OF SOLDIERS PLACED ON BIG FARM

Guelph, July 10.—Fifty-three girls, ranging in age from two to fifteen years, have arrived at Vimy Ridge farm, formerly the Sorby Farm, from Toronto for a taste of country life. The little ones are soldiers' orphans, and wards of the soldiers' aid commission, who took over the 300-acre farm last spring from the war veterans' welfare commission, who utilized it for a time as a vocational training place for maimed ex-service men. Forty-five or fifty boys will arrive on Monday.

The children will be given every care, and everything possible will be done to make the vacation, which will continue to the end of September, an event in the lives of the little ones. Enough produce is grown on the farm to provide the youngsters with plenty of wholesome food.

HOT WEATHER HURTS GRAIN CROP IN WEST

Parts of Saskatchewan Suffers
Severely From Lack
of Rain.

Regina, July 10.—Crops in the central, west central and east central districts of the province are below average, according to a report issued by the Saskatchewan Co-operative Elevator Company today. The report indicates that rain has fallen in many points in the area indicated within the past few days, but owing to the hot weather, previously the rains came too late to bring the crop up to average. At some points wheat from six to twelve inches high is heading out.

In the Regina-Weber south central and south-western districts crops are averaging above the average. Many points in these districts report good prospects and a few forecast a bumper crop.

MANITOBA IMPROVED.

Winnipeg, July 10.—The timely rainfall early this week has materially improved crop prospects in Manitoba, according to the report of the provincial agricultural department issued today.

The crops are reported to be of a fairly good color in all districts, although the present general outlook is for a crop of rather light straw.
