SCOTT SENTENCED TO THE GALLOWS

Loses Fight For Life As Chicago Judge Overrules Appeal.

WILL RENEW BATTLE

Associated Press Despatch. Chicago, Feb. 15.—Russell T. Scott, formerly a London and Toronto, Ontario, broker, who in his early twenties was the head of a \$10,000,000 Canadian corporation organized to build a \$30,000,000 international bridge between Detroit, Mich., and Windsor, Ont., was sentenced Saturday to be hanged April 17, for the murder of Joseph Maurer, a 17-yearold drug clerk, during a hold-up in April, 1924.

Judge Thomas J. Lynch, who sentenced the erstwhile financier, now reduced to penury, overruled a motion for a new trial. Scott's attorneys. however, said an appeal would be taken to the supreme court.

Scott Remains Calm.






