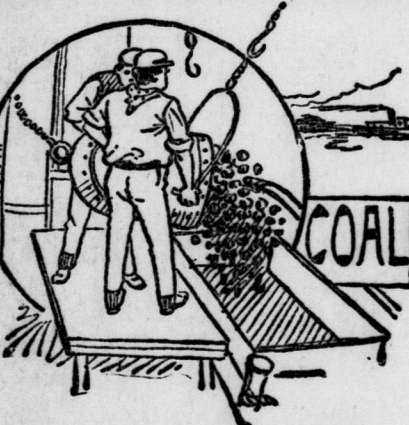

## SEAFORTH GIANT REMOVED TO ASYLUM ONLY AFTER GREAT EFFORT
