"The right to remain at work where others have ceased to work, or to engage anew in work which others abandoned, is part of the personal liberty of a citizen that can never be surrendered, and every infringement thereof merits and should receive the stern denouncement of the law. All government implies restraint, and it is not less necessary in self-governing communities than in others to compel restraint of the passions of men which make for disorder and lawlessness. Our language is the language of a free people and fails to furnish any form of speech by which the

Right of a Citizen to Work

when he pleases, for whom he pleases and on what terms he pleases, can be successfully denied. The common sense of our people as well as the common law forbids that this right should be assailed with impunity. It is vain to deny that the man who remains at work while others cease to work, or takes the place of one who has abandoned his work, helps to defeat the aspirations of men who seek to obtain better recompense for their labor and better conditions of life.

"It should also be observed that Mr.
