Mrs. A. Pratt of Matapedia has learned that her son, Private E. Pratt, was killed in action at the battle of Vimy Ridge on April 9th, 1917. A magnificent memorial service will be held at the Matapedia Community Centre on Saturday, April 14th, at 2 o'clock. The following letter has just received by Mrs. Pratt from Lewis Cook of the battalion in which her son was killed:

My dear Mrs. Pratt:
I am sending you a copy of the *Regimental Magazine* of the 1st Canadian Division, which has in it a full account of the battle of Vimy Ridge.

Dear Mother:

You have doubtless been informed of the death of your son, E. H. Pratt, which occurred during our successful attack of April 9, 1917.

Your son was a good soldier and I am sure you that his loss is deeply felt by all who knew him. He has lost a good soldier and a brave and gallant comrade.

We hope in the years to come time will have lightened this sorrow, the fact that your son died for his country.
