LANCIE CORP. GORDON STEWART IS DEAD

Word of His Death at Toronto Received Here Wednesday. Had Undergone Operation

Word was received here Wednesday of the death at Toronto of Lance Corporal Gordon Stewart of Dalhousie. Lance Corporal Gordon Stewart of the 15th Royal Canadian Highlanders was severely wounded at the battle of Langemarck. After spending some months in English hospitals, he was invalided home, and for some time was at the St. John convalescent hospital. He was able to move about and visited his home at Dalhousie several times.

His wound, which was in the head, bothered him greatly, and an operation was deemed necessary to give him relief. With this in view he recently went to Toronto, where he was operated upon, but never rallied.

Decceased was the youngest son of Mr. Chas. Stewart of Dalhousie, and was well and favorably known throughout the whole county. The family have the sympathy of all in their bereavement. Thus another Restigouche boy has made the supreme sacrifice for his country.

The funeral, with full military honors, will take place at St. John's church, Dalhousie, on Saturday April 1st at 2 o'clock. A special train will leave Campbellton for Dalhousie about noon and will return after the funeral.
