**THE BRITISH DEFEATED**  
IN AN ENGAGEMENT WITH ARABI PASHA'S TROOPS.  
Lively Scenes at the Nile—Deleseppe Becoming Obsolete—The Rebel Leader Addresses the Sultan—Vote of Credit Passed.  
ALEXANDRIA, July 27.—The threatening activity within Arabi's lines is increasing. Arabi's forces are advancing upon the British lines in great numbers and well arranged. The native troops have approached within range of the British between Ramleh and Aboukir, and have opened fire. The English have been defeated in two engagements, leaving forty killed.  
A tremendous conflagration broke out in Alexandria this morning. As seen from the harbor the fire seems to be larger than any since the bombardment.  
An official telegram from the rebel government, dated Cairo, July 26, says that the armament continues on an extensive scale. Volunteers are arriving from Upper and Lower Egypt. Some chiefs of Bedouins, who prior to the bombardment were known as partisans of the khedive, have promised to join the rebel army. The khedive's family now in Cairo are siding with the government. Ladies have formed a committee for the preparation of linen.  
BRITISH OPERATIONS.  
Eight hundred soldiers are being landed from the troopship Orontes. The Orontes will proceed to Port Said and will land there. Great activity prevails in the Egyptian lines. Egyptian soldiers, disguised as Bedouins, have carried off ten miles of supplies from Fort Makbebe, near Neky. Envois from Arabi have been pushing in messages at Makbebe almost daily. It has been therefore decided to occupy the fort, and also the fort commanding the road along Lake Mareout, near which the patrols of the enemy are frequently seen. The fort here is in the native quarter, and believed to be of indigenous origin.  
ARABI'S FRONTIERS.  
The Orontes steamer published a letter from Arabi, declaring that any person found in possession of the proclamation dismissing Arabi from the ministry, circulated in the city, or any other document, would be severely punished. The army will do its duty, and defend the country to its last extremity. If the commercial and political interests of the power do not induce them to stop the present invasion a terrible struggle must ensue. Some Italian, Swiss, German and French residents, including the British consul, are believed to have fled to the British lines, and are being guarded by the British troops.  
Major Byre, had fortified a mile and a half beyond the farthest outpost picked in the Egyptian line, and the British line of the Mahommedieh camp, opposite Mollaha.

**THE ARABIA BILL.**  
It Passes a Second Reading in the House of Lords.  
LONDON, July 27.—In the house of lords a second reading of the bill for the purpose of the bill relating to loans and provisions for emigration, but thought it would be very difficult to obtain proof of tenants liable to pay rent. He hoped that no more drafts would be drawn on the wisdom of the sub-commissioners of the land, but as a political proposition it was insupportable. If the government did not mean to continue to let them make the bill optional for the landlord, there should be some inquiry as to what class of landlords it was that accumulated arrears of rent in order to evict a tenant. Before this act of evicting was committed landlords should be free as tenants to enter into arrangements under the bill. As the bill contained some provisions he heartily approved of, it could not properly be rejected at this time, but in assenting to a second reading he protested against its dangerous principles and would not support it at any future stage unless these dangers were removed. The bill passed a second reading.

**A TERRIFIC EXPLOSION.**  
Twenty-five Hundred Pounds of Powder Blown Up—The Damage.  
CHICAGO, July 27.—While John Sobel was opening a can of powder with a chisel this evening at a quarry in the outskirts of the city an explosion occurred. Sobel was blown thirty feet and severely injured. Sparks flew into the powder house, containing a thousand pounds of giant and 1500 pounds of blasting powder. A terrific explosion followed. The house was blown to fragments. People were knocked down by the concussion many blocks away and a large amount of window glass was broken. Glass was knocked out of some houses several blocks away. Some houses were blown seven miles away. John Anderson, a workman, was thrown a considerable distance and hit his shoulder crushed. Michael Brittain, a teamster carrying wood some distance away was thrown to the ground with a concussion. Mrs. Young and two children, four blocks away, were badly cut by glass. A large number of other people were seriously shocked, but nobody was killed. Sobel will probably recover. The loss is unknown.

**THE BRITISH DEFEATED**  
IN AN ENGAGEMENT WITH ARABI PASHA'S TROOPS.  
Lively Scenes at the Nile—Deleseppe Becoming Obsolete—The Rebel Leader Addresses the Sultan—Vote of Credit Passed.  
ALEXANDRIA, July 27.—The threatening activity within Arabi's lines is increasing. Arabi's forces are advancing upon the British lines in great numbers and well arranged. The native troops have approached within range of the British between Ramleh and Aboukir, and have opened fire. The English have been defeated in two engagements, leaving forty killed.  
A tremendous conflagration broke out in Alexandria this morning. As seen from the harbor the fire seems to be larger than any since the bombardment.  
An official telegram from the rebel government, dated Cairo, July 26, says that the armament continues on an extensive scale. Volunteers are arriving from Upper and Lower Egypt. Some chiefs of Bedouins, who prior to the bombardment were known as partisans of the khedive, have promised to join the rebel army. The khedive's family now in Cairo are siding with the government. Ladies have formed a committee for the preparation of linen.  
BRITISH OPERATIONS.  
Eight hundred soldiers are being landed from the troopship Orontes. The Orontes will proceed to Port Said and will land there. Great activity prevails in the Egyptian lines. Egyptian soldiers, disguised as Bedouins, have carried off ten miles of supplies from Fort Makbebe, near Neky. Envois from Arabi have been pushing in messages at Makbebe almost daily. It has been therefore decided to occupy the fort, and also the fort commanding the road along Lake Mareout, near which the patrols of the enemy are frequently seen. The fort here is in the native quarter, and believed to be of indigenous origin.  
ARABI'S FRONTIERS.  
The Orontes steamer published a letter from Arabi, declaring that any person found in possession of the proclamation dismissing Arabi from the ministry, circulated in the city, or any other document, would be severely punished. The army will do its duty, and defend the country to its last extremity. If the commercial and political interests of the power do not induce them to stop the present invasion a terrible struggle must ensue. Some Italian, Swiss, German and French residents, including the British consul, are believed to have fled to the British lines, and are being guarded by the British troops.

**THE ARABIA BILL.**  
It Passes a Second Reading in the House of Lords.  
LONDON, July 27.—In the house of lords a second reading of the bill for the purpose of the bill relating to loans and provisions for emigration, but thought it would be very difficult to obtain proof of tenants liable to pay rent. He hoped that no more drafts would be drawn on the wisdom of the sub-commissioners of the land, but as a political proposition it was insupportable. If the government did not mean to continue to let them make the bill optional for the landlord, there should be some inquiry as to what class of landlords it was that accumulated arrears of rent in order to evict a tenant. Before this act of evicting was committed landlords should be free as tenants to enter into arrangements under the bill. As the bill contained some provisions he heartily approved of, it could not properly be rejected at this time, but in assenting to a second reading he protested against its dangerous principles and would not support it at any future stage unless these dangers were removed. The bill passed a second reading.

**A TERRIFIC EXPLOSION.**  
Twenty-five Hundred Pounds of Powder Blown Up—The Damage.  
CHICAGO, July 27.—While John Sobel was opening a can of powder with a chisel this evening at a quarry in the outskirts of the city an explosion occurred. Sobel was blown thirty feet and severely injured. Sparks flew into the powder house, containing a thousand pounds of giant and 1500 pounds of blasting powder. A terrific explosion followed. The house was blown to fragments. People were knocked down by the concussion many blocks away and a large amount of window glass was broken. Glass was knocked out of some houses several blocks away. Some houses were blown seven miles away. John Anderson, a workman, was thrown a considerable distance and hit his shoulder crushed. Michael Brittain, a teamster carrying wood some distance away was thrown to the ground with a concussion. Mrs. Young and two children, four blocks away, were badly cut by glass. A large number of other people were seriously shocked, but nobody was killed. Sobel will probably recover. The loss is unknown.
