"Certainly immigration is one of the outstanding needs of the country to-day and I am not arraid of it. The achievement of the future lies in the hands of the Dominion and the womb of time is pregnant with a success that may be ours for the earning. The problems our fathers faced were as difficult of solution as ours to-day. Their victories should be an incentive to us to tackle our problems with the same heroic spirit.

"Let us never lose the faith of our fathers nor forget the corner stone of empire. There are not, I think, many annexations here to-day. My own belief is that the close relations of Canada and Great Britain will count for more and more with every succeeding year. Nothing would be a greater hurt to humanity all the world over than the breaking of the ties that bind Canada and the old land.

"The world is made either for war or peace and the strongest and most important influence for peace pust now is Great Britain. It behooves us to follow the old flag and to keep the Union Jack as the flag of Canadans. 
