THE LUSITANIA SUNK BY GERMAN SUBMARINE. Over 1,100 Go to Their Death by Drowning on the Irish Coast. London, May 8.—The Cunard liner Lusitania, which sailed out of New York last Saturday with more than 2000 souls aboard, lies at the bottom of the ocean off the Irish coast. She was sunk by a German submarine, which sent two torpedoes crashing into her side, while the passengers, seemingly confident that the great, swift vessel could elude the German underwater craft, were having luncheon. The Lusitania was steaming along about ten miles off Old Head, Kinsale, on the last leg of her voyage to Liverpool when, about 2 o'clock in the afternoon, a submarine suddenly appeared, and, so fast as all reports go, fired two torpedoes without warning at the steamer. One struck her near the bows and the other in the engine room. The powerful agents of destruction tore through the vessel's side, causing terrific explosions. Almost immediately great volumes of water poured through the openings, and the Lusitania listed.
