******** History May Yet Decide

That Bethmann-Hollweg

Ranked as a Good German **.........................**

HEN the world arrives at the stage in which it can understand that Germans are not all of one kind but that there may be good Germans and bad Germans, it will probably assign von Bethmann-Hollweg to the former class. At the beginning of the war he loomed out as a monster, but later on when he retired from office it became known that he had not suited the junkers. From the time that Bismarck was dismissed until the revolution in 1918, no Imperial Chancellor could retain office once the Junker class lost confidence in him. Bethmann's peace overtures in 1916 probably did not originate with 1916 probably did not originate with him any more than the German military policy of the months immediately preceding the outbreak of war. He was being used by the military clique which would have been quite ready to make peace almost at any time after 1915 if the existing military boundaries were to be taken as the basis for the permanent adjustment of national frontiers. It was the refusal of the Allies to regard the refusal of the Allies to regard the strategic position as it existed after the first battle of the Marne as anything but temporary which wrecked the efforts of the Germans to bring about a victory by negotiation. The Chancellor, however, must be credit-



ed with having for a long time resisted the plans of Tirpitz for un-resisted submarine warfare. Eventu-ally he yielded, but much against his

will.

Without design, von Bethmann-Hollweg did perhaps more than any other European statesman to clearly define the issues of the war. Within a few days after the invasion of Belgium, he admitted in the Reichstag that Belgium had suffered a wrong. He frankly declared that Germany's action with regard to her little neighbor, whose neutrality she had guaraction with regard to her little neighbor, whose neutrality she had guaranteed, was prompted by "military necessity." Previous to this official statement there had been frequent German claims that Belgium had really taken a hostile attitude toward her by entering into a secret treaty with Britain and France. It had been alleged, too, that what really precipitated the war was the action of some French aviators in flying over German territory. The Imperial Chancellor brushed aside these inventious and thereafter German propagandists had to make use of other

Chancellor brushed aside these inventions and thereafter German propagandists had to make use of other material. Like his master he was shocked when he discovered that Britain meant to erfer the war. He could not conceive that for a "increscrap of paper," an obligation that had been so frequently violated in the past, the British Empire would keep faith with Beigium. Both Chancellor and Kaiser would have sacrificed much, almost anything except their plan against France and Russia, to have had Britain remain neutral. They even went so far as to promise that France's European territory would not be taken if Britiain stood aside. The Chancellors who succeeded you Bethmann-Hollweg were, in comparison, medicarlities. His death on New Year's Day is to be regretted, as he might in course of time have given much useful in formation regarding the fateful summer months of 1914.


