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ADDRESS ON OPHTHALMOLOGY.

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Mr. President and Gentlemen:—I have to thank you for the honour you have done me in asking me to deliver the special address on ophthalmology at this meeting of the Canadian Medical Association, and more especially do I appreciate it from the fact that this meeting is held in my native city.
