



- training Journalists: Canada is well-placed to promote capacity building in the craft of journalism with its tradition of both public and private broadcasting,
- distinguishing between state and public broadcasters: again, with the experience of the CBC/Radio Canada, Canadians understand and embrace the crucial distinctions between a state and a public broadcaster, and can effectively convey this abroad.

Other areas for Canadian involvement include:

- training in human rights and free expression,
- protecting free expression during elections,
- promoting national sources of news and information.

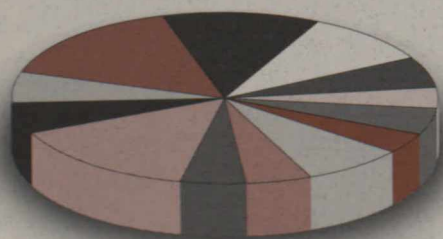
## ■ Indigenous Heritage Rights and APEC

*The "Roundtable on Indigenous Heritage Rights and APEC" was held at the University of Saskatchewan in April 1997. Participants included Canadian indigenous leaders, academics and experts. Some key recommendations include:*

- launching work on a NAFTA-style "side agreement" on environmental issues that explicitly provides for the participation of Indigenous Peoples,
- development of provisions in the APEC process on intellectual property rights for the protection of indigenous heritage,
- broad and effective inclusion of Indigenous Peoples in the APEC process, including in official delegations,
- better information for Indigenous Peoples on APEC.
