QUEEN MARY VETERANS' HOSPITAL. MONTREAL—PARAPLEGIC SERVICE

Question No. 1,862-Mr. Lambert:

- 1. Has a decision been made by the Minister of Veterans Affairs to close down the paraplegic service at the Queen Mary veterans' hospital in Montreal?
- 2. If so, when was the decision reached, and what are the effective dates of the closing?
- 3. What are the reasons for such a decision?

Hon. Roger Teillet (Minister of Veterans Affairs): 1. Yes.

- 2. Montreal officials of the Canadian Paraplegic Association were first informed some two years ago that the department might have to suspend its specialized paraplegic service at Queen Mary veterans hospital. This decision was confirmed in the spring of this year and the effective date of the closing is February 28, 1967.
- 3. Of the 25 beds allotted to the paraplegic service, only one or two are normally occupied by veterans. The remainder are filled by civilian paraplegics referred to Queen Mary veterans hospital by the Canadian Paraplegic Association. As some part of the hospital must be closed to enable urgently required renovations to be carried out, it was decided to close that portion occupied by civilian patients. The deputy minister of health of the province of Quebec has been apprised of the situation and is making alternative arrangements for the care of the civilian paraplegics affected.
