WATERBORNE MOVEMENT OF ENERGY AND OTHER CANADIAN PRODUCTS—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. J. M. Forrestall (Dartmouth-Halifax East): Madam Speaker, the urgency of my rising under Standing Order 43 arises directly from the critical stage of present negotiations between the Government of Canada and the governments of Mexico and Japan.

Given the potential of millions of dollars accruing to Canadian interests and the creation of hundreds of new jobs for Canadian seamen which could flow from matters under discussion with Mexico for the movement of oil, and Japan with respect to new coal movements, and recognizing the need for Canada to continue to move toward the objectives of the UNCTAD 40-40-20 arrangements for the seaborne movement of goods, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Central Nova (Mr. MacKay):

That this House urgently asks the government to express in these discussions going on the Canadian desirability of moving toward the UNCTAD formula in all waterborne movement of these energy resources and other Canadian goods.

MEASURES TO HELP FARMERS IF DROUGHT OCCURS—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

That the federal government move immediately to assist to help co-ordinate, through the use of such federal agencies as the PFRA, the activities of the various levels of government that are now under way in the western provinces which are designed to make maximum use of whatever water, feed and pastures that are still available.

INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT—CONSIDERATION OF BRANDT COMMISSION PROPOSALS—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43
