elected Cabinet Minister under the previous administration. By contrast, we now have 12.

The National Energy Policy was the engine of ruin by which the Liberals punished the people of western Canada. The ripple effects of the NEP are still being felt in the recent collapse of several financial institutions.

The PC Party at Prince Albert promised to listen and to act. The result is the Western Accord which lays the foundation for restored prosperity in western Canada. The Prime Minister (Mr. Mulroney), in holding the First Ministers' conference in Regina, signalled his recognition of the West. Contrast this to the penultimate Prime Minister who asked the farmers: "Why should I sell your wheat?"

Nothing changes. Only last week, in response to a serious question concerning the grasshopper threat on the Prairies, a Liberal responded: "Spray them with PCBs." Same old Liberals, same old hypocrisy, same old arrogance. We in the PC Party know that a truly prosperous Canada can emerge only from strong, revitalized regions. We in western Canada rejoice at being part of Canada once again.

POSTAL RATE INCREASE

Mrs. Thérèse Killens (Saint-Michel-Ahuntsic): Mr. Speaker, in a recent Canada Post Corporation release, it was announced that the postal rate for letters would go up by two cents as of next June 24.

This announcement is an insult to my constituents who have now been waiting for over a year to have their mail delivered at home.

On two occasions, Mr. Speaker, I presented petitions signed by hundreds of residents of my riding to urge the Government to make strong representations to the Canada Post Corporation. This community development is located in the centre of the City of Montreal, and it is altogether unacceptable that this service should not yet be provided for my constituents who pay taxes and should have it.

The cost of postal stamps has jumped 88 per cent since 1981, from 17 to 32 cents. Canada is already one of the major western countries where postal rates are among the highest. Should the Government approve this increase, our postal rates will have doubled over the past four years.

On behalf of my constituents who are taxed for services they do not even get, Mr. Speaker, I object to this rate increase.

PERMANENCY OF DEMONSTRATION ON PARLIAMENT HILL
