REMOVAL OF CERTAIN PUBLICATIONS FROM SENATE READING ROOM-PRIVILEGE

Hon. M. Grattan O'Leary: Honourable senators, before the Orders of the Day are called, there is a matter I should like to bring before the house, perhaps as a question of privilege. It concerns what has been happening to the Reading Room of this Senate. I am aware of the decision reached by the Committee on Internal Economy and Contingent Accounts to make certain changes which would involve a place of, let us say, rest or recreation, and I am in favour of that decision, but I am not in favour of what has been done to the Reading Room itself.

Since coming to this house I have had occasion to use that Reading Room nearly every day. I have used it even on occasions when this house was not in session. During the past week or two there has been committed upon that Reading Room what I can only characterize as an outrageous piece of vandalism.

Someone acting on somebody's orders went in there and removed a number of invaluable magazines and reviews. I will go over briefly some of the reviews, magazines and newspapers which were removed, by whose authority I do not know.

For example, one of the newspapers removed was the Washington Post, considered the second-best newspaper in the United States or in North America. The Atlantic Monthly has been taken from the racks, as well. The Atlantic Monthly, one of the magazines we have had for many decades, with a cultural distinction which honoured the American people, has been removed.
