

**BANKS PROFITED  
BY MISSION FUND**

Methodist Pastor Says They  
Realized Over Six Thou-  
sand Dollars.

**IMMORALITY IN CITY**

Report of President of Victor  
Mission Stagers Con-  
ference.

Toronto bankers made six thousand dollars last year out of the Methodist mission fund. This was for advances totaling over \$300,000. This was announced by Rev. C. E. Manning, who yesterday afternoon set the conference discussing the question of who was responsible. He claimed that if the preachers adopted the up-to-date methods of the laymen's movement in every circuit, and of the Women's Missionary Society, the money could be secured in advance, and in much larger amounts. As it was a number of men who had finished a college course in preparation for the foreign field had to be kept at home through lack of funds. Several parties from rural districts took back.

Rev. Dr. Chambers was applauded when he said that exultation and not a note of censure was in order. The debate closer with a vote of thanks to the mission board officials for their services. The immorality disclosures made by Rev. W. Dean, superintendent of the Fred Victor Mission, made the members look agast at the speaker. He attributed vice to human depravity, and cited the case of a young girl whose fall was caused by a Methodist Sunday school teacher. Many girls and their babies had to be cared for at the Fred Victor Mission on account of immorality. The mission was, however, doing its best to help the institution. "We are a shipyard where 10,000 souls have been guided with safety," he declared.

The conference passed a resolution that "immorality per se must be included among the criminal offences covered by the laws of the land. Consent at any age cannot condone the offence."

The conference also went on record as being "unilaterally opposed to the separate school system of this province as being at once a religious problem, against the other religious bodies of the province and a menace to our Protestant ideals of citizenship."

Regarding the labor problem, the conference "recommended the largest degree of co-operation possible between employer and employee."

**DR. G. C. MATHISON  
DIES IN WINNIPEG**

Well-Known Dentist Suc-  
cumbs After Illness of  
Two Weeks.

The death of Dr. George Christie Mathison, a prominent dentist of Winnipeg, occurred Saturday night, after two weeks' illness. He was born 37 years ago in London, Ont., and graduated from the University of Toronto and University of Pennsylvania, taking the degrees of D.D.S. and L.D.S., and for the last 15 years had practised his profession in Winnipeg.

Dr. Mathison was the younger son of Mr. R. Mathison, supreme secretary-treasurer of the Independent Order of Foresters, formerly superintendent and principal of the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb at Belleville, Ont., and his brother, Dr. Robert Mathison of Kelowna, B. C.

LONDON, June 17.—(Can. Press).—  
The debate tomorrow in the house of  
commons on the "scandals" connected  
with ministerial transactions in Mar-
