GRAIN GROWERS WILL HANDLE FACTORY OUTPUT
 WINNIPEG, March 4.—A deal, unique in its conception, was completed today when the Sarnia Fence Company agreed to turn over its entire western business to the Grain Growers' Grain Company, which will pay a stated price per ton for the output of the factory and will retail it among the members of the association of Manitoba and the United Farmers of Alberta at a working margin above cost. The agreement goes into effect within ten days.
