FAMILY WAS WIPED OUT WHEN TRAIN HIT MOTOR

Seven Were Killed Instantly and Father Cannot Recover From Injuries Sustained in Accident.

DETROIT, Oct. 24.—Seven members of one family were instantly killed and an eighth was fatally injured by a Grand Trunk passenger train which struck an automobile at Fraser, Mich., 16 miles from Detroit.
The dead are Mrs. Rachel Stoldt, 47 years old, her five daughters, Pearl, 17; Esther, 16; Hazel, 12; Mabel, 10 and 47, a sister of Mrs. Stoldt, William Stoldt, a farmer of Troy, Mich., the husband and father, was badly injured. There were no witnesses of the accident. Apparently Stoldt was driving the automobile did not see or hear the approaching train and drove the machine on the crossing directly in front of the locomotive. Stoldt cannot recover.

SERBIANS DRIVEN BACK BUT REGAINED POSITION
Enemy Made Determined Bomb Attack, But Lost Advantage Won.
NISH, Friday, Oct. 22, via London, Oct. 23, 1 a.m., Delayed.—The official communication issued by the war office today says: "On the 21st fighting continued along the northern front in the direction of the Morava. Our troops held positions on the right bank of the Mlaka River. Near Stakcleva our troops drove the enemy out of their lines. In the Belgrade section of the fighting continued without change of position.
"On the eastern front at Kniazevatz, the enemy, dispossessed of large forces, attacked again our position at Matkovic and carried it after a determined bomb attack, but with a counter-attack we won back the position."

AGITATE FOR MEN FOR HOME GUARD

Recruiting Addresses Given at Open Air Recruiting Meeting in Hamilton.

GOOD TRAINING CORPS

Many Soldiers Furnished for Active Service by This Unit.

HAMILTON, Monday, Oct. 25.—An open-air meeting in the interest of the Hamilton Home Guards was held at the corner of Belton and Ottawa streets last evening, when addresses were delivered by Messrs. Landers, W. H. Wardrop, K.C., and Captain Harry Stead. The speaker told of what the home guard has done during the past year for the local regiments and what is expected from the organization in the future, as the military officials are now depending largely on the home guards for recruits to fill in the ranks of the local regiments. It was found necessary to revise the various companies, and the corps is now on the actual basis of a battalion. There is room for more recruits, and it is expected that those who cannot join the city regiments or go overseas will join the home guard.

GREECE NOT MENACED BY ENTENTE POWERS

German Report of Threat to Blockade Coast Without Foundation.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—A semi-official statement issued at Athens and telegraphed to Reuters Telegram Co. here emphatically denies the German report that the entente powers at Petrograd had a long conversation with the head of Balkan affairs department of the German foreign office, threatening language and spoke of a blockade of the coasts of Greece by the entente powers.

COMPANY FORMED TO HANDLE TRADE

All Products From the United States Will Be Looked After

WILL ASSURE SAFETY

Neutral - Bound Commerce Will Not Be Interfered With.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—Formation of an American trust company, similar to the one in the Netherlands Overseas Trust, to handle American products abroad, with assurances that the company will not reach the belligerents, was announced today by Secretary Redfield of the department of commerce. The company will have the handling of all export shipments from the United States to neutral countries. He said that while the government would not officially guarantee to belligerent countries in Europe that the goods shipped under agreement with the American company would not reach their enemies, the government would exercise such supervision as would insure the complete neutrality of the commerce carried on by the new American company.

WOMEN WORKERS TO GET FULL PAY

Militant Suffragettes Hail Announcement as Victory for the Cause.

LONDON, Oct. 22.—In a statement issued today, David Lloyd George, minister of munitions, announced that women 18 years old and over engaged in munition, receive a minimum wage of one pound weekly. When doing skilled work, on time or by piece, women get the same pay as men, the official recognition of the right of women to receive the same pay as men for the same work is claimed as a great victory by militant suffragettes who have long been agitating the question.

FRONTIER AGAIN CLOSED.

GENEVA, Switzerland, via Paris, Oct. 23.—Germany again is closed from every condition. No steamers are allowed to approach the landing on the lower shore of Lake Constance. It is assumed as heretofore that the closing of the frontier is to keep in front of German troops.

HIGHLANDER SHOT BY HIS CAPTORS

Information Regarding Pte. David Moncur Received by Father in Toronto.

ANOTHER OUTRAGE

News of Atrocity Arrives After Year of Waiting and Watching.

In reply to enquiries regarding the circumstances of the death of his son, Dan Moncur of 34 Harriett street, has received the following letter from the British war office, which discloses the fact that another outrage has been committed by the Germans in Belgium.

War Office, London, S.W.
October 24, 1915.
Sir: In reply to your letter concerning 365 (Private David Moncur, 2nd Battalion, Gordon Highlanders), I am commanded by the army council to inform you that it is regretted that this soldier is reported to have been killed near Ghelvelst on Oct. 31, 1914, in the following circumstances:
The machine gun officer states that he and Private Moncur were both wounded and together with another man were captured by the Germans, who were around them in large numbers. He ordered them to surrender, as it was impossible to carry him up some distance from where they were, which they did. Some few minutes later they were taken away about fifty yards and both shot. The man who shot them put his rifle right against their bodies as he fired.
There is no excuse for the shooting of these men as their captors had previously asked if they would go with them and the officer replied that they would.

I am asked to express the sympathy of the army council with the soldier's relatives.

STEAMER BLOWN UP BY FLOATING MINE

Swedish Craft Had Been Captured by German Submarine.

LONDON, Oct. 24.—A despatch to Reuters Telegram Co. from Wisby, Sweden, says that the Swedish steamer Ruma, of 1400 tons, has struck a mine off the east Granton lighthouse. The force of the explosion broke her in two, the forward part sinking immediately. Six of the crew, who were on the fore-castle at the time of the explosion, were killed.
