preferable to the South in the Expence of catching, curing, and drying of Fish; and, likewise, how much sooner the French got to the Markets than they did, as well as the Preservence that was given to their Fish, which encouraged our People to make an Attempt to fish there also; having, by the Treaty, more than an equal Right, upon the North Part of the Coast of the said Island: But they found, that the French had not only built Hutts and Stages on all the best Parts of that Coast, but assumed an exclusive Right of fishing there: So that in or about the Year 1742, they fired on our Fishing Vessels, and destroyed some of their Boats. Complaints of those Insults being made to our then Ministers, a Remonstrance was made to the Court of France; but no Satisfaction being infifted on, on our Side, the English Fishermen never ventured to go there any more, lest further Mischief should The French then fo far succeeded in enfine. that most valuable Branch of Trade, as to get the Preference in most of the European Markets; which, at a moderate Computation, makes a Difference, to this Nation, in the Sale of Fish, of upwards of Two Millions
