Farmer's Calendar.—All vegetation is now on the *spring*; hence the name of this season of the year. Farmers too are on the alert, and every thing seems to be teeming with life and vigor. Speed the plough we say, and prosperity to the tillers, of the soil. Plough your ground thoroughly, and repeatedly: this, in a good measure, is a substitute for slight manuring. Set out fruit trees; be not sparing in pains to cultivate the apple, the pear, the cherry, and the plum. Now is the time for grafting, let every boy learn the art. There is no more difficulty in grafting a tree than in planting a hill of corn. Plant peas, potatoes, and other early vegetables. It is said that wheat and rye sown in the new of the moon will not smut. Dig up your last fall's manure heap. The
