

CARD-EXERCISE XXXI.

Maple-Leaf Design.

Draw a horizontal and a vertical line of the same given length, bisecting each other. Divide each into thirds. Unite the points of division, thus forming a square on its diagonals. Within the square, draw a trefoil; within the trefoil, a curved equilateral triangle. On the outer third of the vertical and horizontal lines, draw conventionalized maple-leaves, having the proportions and shape of the one in the last card-exercise.



CARD-EXERCISE XXXII.

Conventionalized Form: Simple Leaves and Flowers.

Draw the vertical line 1 2, and divide it into four equal parts. Make 3 4, 5 6, equal to one-half of the vertical line, 3 4 to be drawn through the upper point of division on the vertical line. Draw first the midribs and stems of the leaves, and then their margins. Draw the flower at the top, and lastly the little circles at the bottom, representing the berries.
