





the navy department has a lot of old brown powder on its hands and being unable to persuade anybody to buy it or use it. it is raising crops from it. to its own surprise, as a fertilizer. The brown powder went out of fashion because it made too much smoke,

and it went when smokeless powder was invented. The old powder contained about eighty per cent. potassium nitrate, consisting of potash and nitrogen, both of which are largely constitutents in fertilizers. Not being able to dispose of the pow-


