ARREST SIR WM. REID

Head of Newfoundland Railway Taken Into Custody on Charge by Union President.

St. Johns, N.F., Jan. 12.—Sir Willaw, Walter J. Scott, 194 S iam Reid, head of the Newfoundland avenue, Toronto, on Jan. 11, 191 Pail ways, was arrested here today on a charge of criminal libel made by William Coaker, a member of the new Lloyd ministry and president of the Fishermen's Protective Union. The action was taken by Mr. Coaker as a result of the publication of a letter from Sir William to Lord Shaughnessy of Montreal, stating that Coaker was brought to Ottawa early in 1916 to be posted on matters relating to the proposed confedera-tion of Newfoundland with the Dominion of Canada. While there, Sir William's letter stated, Mr. Coaker was introduced to Sir Robert Borden, the premier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, former premier, and other Canadian political leaders as an outcome of negotiations for the proposed confederation alleged to have been initiated by Lord Shaughnessy and fin-alized by Sir William Reid. inasmuch as the subject of a proposed confederation between Newfoundland and Canada has aroused bitter con-troversy in this colony, sensational developments are expected.
