Howley's Steam-Roller Puffs Along for Two More Victories

Justin Blanks the Bears in First Game--Leafs Clout Out a Win in Second Half of the Bargain Bill

Dan Howley and his climbing Leafs arrived home yesterday morning and staged a double bill with the Newark Bears in the afternoon. Tom McCarthy tried hard to stop the Leafs' winning streak, but was not successful, and the double victory yesterday makes it twelve straight wins.

The Leafs looked every bit as good as the glowing reports that preceded them. The first heat was easy. Justin shut out the Newark outfit 5 to 0. Only five hits were secured off the Toronto pitcher, and Ted Cather, a Leaf of the old days, grabbed four of them.

Dan's boys came from behind to nab the second half of the bill. The Leafs went after Rommel with a will in the eighth, and bunched three singles and a triple for four runs. This made the final count 4 to 2.

Duke Reilly was very much in the limelight with some grand clouting and a great performance in the left garden. His duking chased the ball all over the field, making several hard catches.

Johnny Moken, late of Waco, Texas, made his first appearance on the local lot. He hits nicely, is a smart fielder and a great waiter at the plate. He hit the popular fancy.

The Howleyites walked away with the first game, 5 to 0, when Hal Justin furnished one of his good turns. Ted Cather, the old-time Leaf, was the only Bear that could find Justin with any regularity. Cather, himself, collected four raps in as many efforts. Only one other hit was secured off Justin.

After the third inning the Leafs kept pecking away, until they had piled up five runs and were extended. Swigler started the pitching for Newark, and retired in the fifth, after he nearly lost a finger trying to pull down one of Leaf's hot liners. Rommel finished the heat.

The Leafs were full of life on the field and looked a top-notch team at all stages of the game. Reilly was especially brilliant, with some hard catches in the field. Reilly backed up everything on his side of the diamond, and helped himself to two nice hits.

work until the fourth, and then scored two runs. Lear batted out a double and Purtell sacrificed and was safe when Rommel, who was playing first at this time, let the throw get away from him. Onslow batted out, but Lear was run down between third and home. Mokan made a perfect throw to the plate and Harpin's throw to first. Reilly's roller, and another run counted. Justin ended it with a bouncer to the pitcher.

The fifth and last inning was for the Leafs. Reilly and Wagner were walked, and then Callahan beat out a bunt. Lear drove one into the pitcher's box and Reilly was cut off at the plate. Swigler nearly lost his thumb flinging this one, and had to move over to first, and Rommel took up the pitching duty. Purtell raised a sacrifice fly for the run, and Onslow flied out.

The Leafs' last run came in the seventh. Wagner singled and was forced at second by Callahan. Lear struck out, but Purtell moved Callahan to third with a single. Purtell and Callahan worked the double steal, the latter crossing the plate. Onslow rolled out. This completed the afternoon's work.

As the Leafs have been away for nearly two weeks the fans are very anxious to get a glimpse at Howley's boys, especially after their success in winning ten straight on the road. It has keyed the fans up to the highest pitch of excitement and they will turn out in full force this afternoon to help the Howleyites grab two games if possible from the Newark Bears.

If Bugs Herche is not slated to pitch he will perform his comedy stunts on the coaching line. The Toronto Ferry Co. expects a record crowd today and will provide special boat service. Reserved seats and combination tickets are on sale at Moody's.
