### POLITICAL FIGHTS WERE FORGOTTEN

In the Congratulations That Were  
Tipped Across the Floor of  
the House Yesterday.

Ottawa, July 3.—A pleasing little incident occurred on the opening of the House this afternoon. When Sir Charles Tupper took his seat after prayers were said, he was received with great applause from the Opposition benches, which was joined in from the Ministerial side. One of the pages advanced, and laid on his desk a magnificent bunch of 78 blue and crimson roses, presented to him by Conservative friends. This caused more applause, which was renewed again and again, when, on the orders of the day being called, the Premier took occasion to compliment the leader of the Opposition on his birthday, which was yesterday, and a little bit of good-natured chaffing was indulged in, when Sir Wilfrid Laurier expressed the hope that Sir Charles would be long spared to occupy the position he so ably filled. This "one rose for each year" was a very pretty compliment, and the House then went into committee on the Government measures were advanced a stage, and the House sent the balance of the evening in supply on the main estimates.

**Ottawa's Special Privilege.**  
In reply to a question asked for Mr. Bergeron, whether it is the intention of the Government to indemnify every city or town in Canada where there are Dominion public buildings as they intend to do for the city of Ottawa, as per resolution before Parliament.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said: My hon. friend

is over-inquisitive and over-zealous. I am sorry to inform him that no town or city has claimed the same privileges as have been claimed by the city of Ottawa.

**Penitentiary Superannuations.**  
In reply to a question put for Mr. Clarke with regard to superannuations at Kingston penitentiary.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier gave a list of the employees who had been superannuated since Jan. 1, 1890, with age and length of service, and said that the superannuations were made on the recommendation of the surgeon of the penitentiary, acting under instructions from the inspector. All the recommendations were adopted and carried into operation at once. The persons recommended for superannuation were medically examined by the penitentiary surgeon.

**No Job for Maxwell.**  
Col. Prior, on the orders of the day being called, drew attention to a paragraph in the Victoria Colonist of June 22, in which it was stated that The Vancouver World had announced that Mr. Maxwell, M.P. for Burrard, would be appointed postmaster of Vancouver before the close of the session, and asked if there was any truth in the statement.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that there had been no suggestion of any such appointment, and he hoped that Mr. Maxwell would long remain in the House.

**Congratulated Sir Charles.**  
Continuing, he said that while he was on the floor, he would give the permission of the House, congratulate the leader of the Opposition on the 80th anniversary of his birthday.

Sir Charles Tupper: Not quite as much as that.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier corrected himself and said his "78th birthday." He hoped that the hon. gentleman would enjoy many more birthdays, and live long to occupy the position he so ably filled. (Laughter and applause.)

Sir Charles Tupper said he hoped the House would pardon him for occupying a moment in thanking his hon. friend. This was his last birthday, and at the time of life he could not afford to make even so small a present to his age. (Great laughter and applause.)

**In Concurrence.**  
The House went into concurrence on the supplementary estimates for 1898-99, which were run through in half an hour.

**Roast on Railway Stocks.**  
The House then went into committee on the Government Insurance Act.

Mr. Foster doubted the advisability of insurance companies being allowed to invest in railway stocks, which were by no means

"gilt edged," and the Minister of Finance agreeing with him, the committee rose and reported progress, it being understood that Mr. Foster would draft an amendment to the investment clause to be submitted when the House again goes into committee on the bill.

**Redistribution Bill To-Day.**  
At the suggestion of Sir Charles Tupper, the Premier fixed the continuation of the discussion on the redistribution bill for tomorrow, and the Speaker left the chair at 5 o'clock.

**Bills Advanced.**  
After recess the following bills passed through committee and stand for third reading: To amend the Dominion Land Titles Act—Mr. Sifton.

To amend the Unorganized Territories Game Preservation Act—Mr. Sifton.

**Half-Breed's Scrip.**  
In committee on the act to further amend the Dominion Land Act—Mr. Sifton—a long discussion took place on the issue of scrip to half-breeds in extinguishment of the aboriginal title to the land. The custom has been to issue scrip for 250 acres of land, the scrip being taken by the Government in payment for land at the rate of \$1 acre, but very difficult to get him to sign anything. There were about 2000 Indians entitled to receive scrip.

The bill finally passed through committee and was reported.

**Customs Act Amendment.**  
In committee on the bill to amend the Customs Act—Mr. Patterson—there was a long discussion on the proposition to repeal the present clause of the Customs Act relating to the export of deer. It was pointed out that the Province issued licenses permitting the killing of deer, but the Dominion prohibited the exportation of game. Some of the Provinces, notably Quebec, made an offence to leave the carcass on the ground, so that all the sportsmen from the United States could do was to export the deer to the States. The discussion was continued until 12:15, when the bill was passed through committee and the House adjourned.

**The Durham Races.**  
Durham, July 3.—The summer meeting of the Durham Turf Club was held here to-day under rather unfavorable circumstances. An almost steady rain spoiled what otherwise would have been a most successful event.
