ONTARIO IS HEALTHY.

**Average Period of Life in This Province is Materially Lengthening.**

From statistics in the department of the Registrar-General dating back to 1880, it appears that the average period of life in this province is lengthening.

In 1880 the average was about 35 years; in 1892 it had grown to 39 years, and in 1898 had reached the 40 mark. In 1892 the figure stood at 33½ years, and the latest records show the average to be well on to 36 years.

The question is how much the Government had to do with this result, or would the average be greater if it were not for the fact that the rate of mortality is noted in the percentage of infant mortality, while in the case of the other diseases there have also been material reductions. Taking it all round, Ontario is, it is asserted, claim to be the healthiest place for its size in the world.
