

HORSE SHOW WAS A GREAT SUCCESS

Equine Exhibition at St. Thomas Surpasses Most Sanguine Expectations.

St. Thomas, Sept. 17.—Nearly 5,000 people visited the horse show today, the attendance surpassing the most sanguine hopes of the association.

During the evening, Hon. Adam Beck, with four accompanying hunters and about 20 hounds of the London Hunt Club, gave an exhibition of jumping and tally-ho exercises. In this event Mr. Beck rode a beautiful chestnut gelding, five years old, by Grand Falconer, and raised by Mr. Robinson, of the Profit Line road, Middlesex county. In the jumping competition earlier he received first prize.

PREDICTS FIERY IRISH REVOLT

Famine Is Now Bitterly Pinching the Emerald Isle.

London, Sept. 17.—Robert Hunter, the well-known New York sociologist, after many months of study of the industrial and sociological conditions in the chief cities of Europe, has returned to London. In Ireland he studied conditions closely, especially in the western counties. Mr. Hunter says:

"The trouble with Ireland is land-lordism. The people cannot get land enough to till to make a living. Misery and poverty are visible in the western counties. Depressing faminous conditions are certain to prevail there during the winter. The potato crop has been an entire failure owing to the wet summer. With famine menacing them there is no telling what the people may be driven to this winter."

"The Government authorities are becoming alarmed. They are increasing the police force everywhere. Obviously the Government is expecting widespread trouble this winter. "Since the strike of the Royal Irish Constabulary in Belfast the authorities have reason to believe that the traditional loyalty of this splendid body of men may have been diminished."

"I found a demand for home rule greater than ever. There is a spirit of revolt in the air. I was struck by the enthusiasm of the members of various organizations to secure an Irish Ireland. Wherever I went I found people attending public meetings, where vast crowds showed their deadly earnestness in demanding home rule."

"The Irish have ceased to expect anything from the British Parliament. They decline to accept anything but home rule. They are convinced that the time for compromise has passed."

"Home rule or nothing is their cry. I was amazed to find everywhere young men joining leagues for the economic upholding of Ireland."

"The conditions in Ireland are generally improving, thanks to the re-awakened energy of the people, especially young men."

"On the agrarian side things are becoming serious. In many counties the people are resorting to violence to prevent the letting of farms for grazing."

"I was surprised to find a wave of temperance sweeping over Ireland. Young men everywhere are preaching the moral cause of temperance on political ground. It is argued that the way to lift England is to stop increasing England's revenue from the sale of beer and whisky."

"Strong Drink Unpopular."

"This policy is certain to decrease the bank accounts of the largest Irish landlords who are brewers and distillers. It is now unpopular for young Irishmen to drink. Ireland today contains more extraordinary young men of intelligence and industry than I've seen in any other country. Ireland's salvation depends on her youth; that they will not fail her."

"Ireland's grievances are real. Misgovernment and landlordism are at the bottom of them. From 1871 to 1907 2,000,000 sturdy emigrants left Ireland. In 37 years the population has decreased 20 per cent, while England's population has increased in the same ratio. In 1871 there were 5,621,000 acres under cultivation. In 1906 only 4,727,000. Nearly 1,000,000 acres of land have gone out of cultivation in forty years. That is where the Irish shoe pinches."

"While it is becoming more difficult for people to get land, yet taxation is increasing and the population decreasing. In 1871 taxation in Ireland was \$35,000,000, and in 1906 it had increased to nearly \$50,000,000. The per capita taxation has nearly doubled in forty years."

WEYLER'S MEMOIRS DONE

The General Has Finished Story of His Rule in Cuba.

Madrid, Sept. 16.—Gen. Weyler has finished writing his memoirs of the time he was governor-general of Cuba, according to an announcement just issued.

Gen. Weyler was prominent in the Carlist war in Spain and in the Spanish war against the Moors in Africa. He was a great favorite with Valmaseda, who was his predecessor in the unenviable position of governor-general of Cuba—the Conservatives, Reformists and Autonomists. There were many stories of his extreme brutality as governor-general of Cuba, but these he denied.

A recent estimate of the population of Seoul gives the total at 199,305. In every ward but the north one the number of males exceeds that of females, but in that part of the city the number of males is given as 17,000, while the females are 90,000. This would seem to explain on any ordinary theory of population.

Seoul has no quarter set aside for the exclusive residence of females.

Some Local Military History.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: I notice an item in a contemporary concerning the finding of a brass plate about three inches square, bearing the crest of the Eighty-first Regiment.

The writer of the article concluded by saying: "The Eighty-first Regiment was not among those stationed in London in the sixties, and the most probable explanation would be that it was lost by some veteran who came to Canada after the battle of Waterloo."

London was a military garrison in the latter part of the 30's, and continued to be such up to the withdrawal of regular British troops preceding the Crimean war. The Eighty-first Regiment succeeded the Twenty-third Royal Welsh Fusiliers in the London garrison in 1845. The plate found is what was called in those days a "breastplate." It was used to clasp the crossbelts then worn, one carrying the bayonet or sword, the other the pouch. The plate joined them where they crossed on the soldier's breast. That style of equipment was abandoned during the Crimean war.

Australia and Canada.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: Under the heading of "Doesn't Fame People of the West" in one of the issues of The Advertiser of last week, some comments are made by a former resident of London about the Japanese and Australia, etc.

Now, I have resided in Australia, and traveler extensively all over the island continent, also, in Honolulu, and the Hawaiian Islands, etc., and I am prepared to contradict the statements referred to in every particular.

In the first place it must be considered very unjust and improper for anyone to side in with lynch law and encourage mob rule.

The Japanese in British Columbia have certain rights and privileges, and the law should see that they are properly protected, and that they receive British fair play and justice.

To mind their own business, which they strictly do, and to work for what wages they choose is no crime.

As to the alleged fifth and immoral charges against them in Honolulu—such a statement is absolutely untrue.

As to Australia, it is far from being the only country in the world, and there are many reasons why Canadians should not be advised to go there. The climatic conditions alone would render it very undesirable for Canadians, and the statement that "the country is run by the labor party"—(even if true, which it is not)—

would be an exceedingly doubtful recommendation.

The great mass of people in Australia—the land of the Sunbrowsers—are in poorer circumstances than any people in Ontario, and instead of knowing "how to live," they merely exist, and anyone who knows anything about their staple article of diet, the famous "damper" (an indigestible mixture of American flour, salt and water cooked in a sodden way in a bark camp fire) and their infamous black "billy" of tea, will admit this.

It is easy money for anyone who goes in for the liquor business to do a thriving trade in a mining district, especially as in Australia, where the seductive harmaid still holds sway, and "easy money" business also applies to the selling of drugs and nostrums.

As for morality or rather the lack of it, in Australia, it is about on a par with California, and every traveler knows to what a low ebb it has reached in the "Land of the Forty-Niners." There, too, as a rule it is the Japanese who are the most clean in their habits, and the most moral class in the community. It is at least not they who make use of the daily divorce court held in San Francisco, the earthquake city.

There is altogether too much of this advising Canadians, or rather our Ontario people, to go to some foreign country or district. Those who are comfortably located in Ontario had better remain where they are, or they may "travel further and fare worse."

Certainly no man with a wife and family should think of leaving the temperate and moral atmosphere of the "Land of the Maple" to seek for Leichart's lonely grave, in the tainted, parched and burning soil of a far distant convict land.

A WALKING BOMB

Girl's Desperate Plan to Blow Up Russian Secret Police.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 17.—The police today arrested a young girl nicknamed "Wanda," who is accused of participation in a plot to blow up the headquarters of the secret police, situated on the Molokan, whose torture chambers have aroused bitter feelings. The police claim that "Wanda" planned to become a walking bomb, and enter the headquarters building in the middle of the day, when it is generally full of people, wearing the uniform of a gendarme, lined with wads of gun-cotton, and carrying powerful bombs.

"Wanda," the police add, hoped by blowing herself up to reduce the entire building to ruins, and kill all the officers composing the staff of the political police. The plot was betrayed, and the police, in addition to making "Wanda" a prisoner, arrested a tailor in whose house they seized a half-ready uniform, which was intended for the female prisoner. In consequence of the murderous design, the secret police have decided to give up their present quarters, removing to an isolated building on Kamenny Island, where an electrical system will be installed in order to prevent undermining.

FATALITY AT BELGRAVE

Richard Leishman Found Dead in a Shallow Creek.

Wingham, Sept. 17.—What is thought to be a deliberate suicide is reported from Belgrave, a village six miles south of here. Richard Leishman, an old resident of the township of East Wawanosh, was found dead in the shallow waters of a creek. The unfortunate man leaves a grown-up family of children. He was about 65 years of age, and had resided in the township of East Wawanosh all his life.

Later particulars of the Leishman case indicate that it was the act of a demented man. The water in the creek was only a few inches deep, but from the appearance of the body when found there were evidences of where the face had been pressed against the pebbles in the bed of the creek. It is possible that he may have fallen in the fainting fit into the creek, but the general opinion is that it was a determined case of suicide while temporarily insane.

Mr. James Gowdy, an old resident of this vicinity, has just passed away after a brief illness resulting from blood poisoning, setting in from an injury to his foot. He was 55 years of age, and leaves a widow and family of children. Interment took place in the Wingham Cemetery.
