WEYLER'S MEMOIRS DONE

The General Has Finished Story of His Rule in Cuba.

Madrid, Sept. 16.-Gen. Weyler has finished writing his memoirs of the time he was governor-general of Cuba, according to an

announcement just issued. Gen. Weyler was prominent in the Carlist war in Spain and in the Spanish war against the Moors in Africa. He was a great favorite with Valmaseda, who was his predecessor in the unenviable title of "butcher," as he was in his military and civil title. But Weyler's reputation soon outgrew that of his commanding officer and the stories of his cruelties during the ten years' war in Cuba survived the pacification of the island, and gained in

Campos as governor-general of Cuba, the Spanish Government was accused of selecting for commandern-chief a man whose repute for atrocio inhumanity would scare the rebels into submission.
