DIED IN A FIT OF COUGHING

Sudden Demise of an Elderly Man at Toronto—Boy Crushed to Death.

DIED IN A COUGHING FIT.
Toronto, Nov. 22.—An elderly gentleman named Leonard was attacked with a severe fit of coughing and died suddenly at the residence of James Gallagher, 44 "Pape" avenue. Dr. Passmore, summoned, but arrived too late to render aid. It is supposed that Mr. Leonard's death was due to the bursting of a blood vessel.

FOUND IN TORONTO BAY.
Toronto, Nov. 22.—The dead body of Rosa May, a middle-aged laundress, was found in the bay at the foot of Cherry street today by two men employed on a dredge. The woman's identity was established from letters found in her pocket. She was penniless and despondent, and it is regarded as a clear case of suicide.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.
Kingston, Ont., Nov. 22.—A dispatch from Morton, Ont., says: "Marion Stevens, while playing at David Meakin's, went to the door. She knocked a gun down, and as she went to pick it up, she accidentally shot herself in the right side, cutting an artery leading from the heart and died instantly."

CRUSHED TO DEATH.
Toronto, Nov. 22.—Yesterday afternoon a score of boys were playing in and around an unoccupied frame building on Evans avenue, when it suddenly collapsed, burying several of the boys in the ruins. Wm. Barry, aged 8, died a few minutes after being taken out. Willie Brash, 12 years, and Frank Cogshall, 10 years were terribly injured, and are in a critical condition. Several got away unhurt. The collapse of the building was caused by the boys chopping away the posts and scantling to feed a bonfire they had started in an adjoining ravine.

The little mix-up between Rev. Richard Hatchett and Rev. William Le Burtis, which occurred last Thursday at the store of the latter on Dundas street, Woodstock, led to the appearance in the police court of Alexander Green on Saturday afternoon. Green is an adopted son of Mrs. Le Burtis, and he was charged with assaulting Mr. Hatchett. Rev. Wm. Le Burtis said he had been called a liar by the reverend gentleman, and had consequently ordered him out. He said he would go when he got ready. Then Le Burtis and Green put him out twice. Rev. Mr. Hatchett threw a stone through the window. Green was fined \$5 and costs. Rev. Mr. Hatchett claimed Rev. Mr. Le Burtis was drunk.

IT WAS QUITE UNEXPECTED!

Commercial Treaty Between France and Italy.

Speculation Regarding Its Effect on European Alliances.

Paris, Nov. 22.—It was quite unexpectedly announced yesterday that a commercial treaty had been concluded between France and Italy, granting mutually favored treatment, except for silk goods, which will remain subject to the maximum tariff. A bill, embodying the agreement, will be submitted immediately to the chamber of deputies. The government also introduced a bill in the chamber today modifying the wine duties favorable to Italy. The negotiations that have culminated in this arrangement have been on foot for two years. But nobody believed that a definite agreement was pending. It is believed that the French affair was instrumental in inducing France to grant the necessary concessions, though it is noteworthy that the silk duties, which caused the breaking of the treaty in 1887, remain almost unchanged. The negotiations have been conducted with the utmost secrecy.

The exact effect of the concessions involved is not known as yet, but it is expected that they will have an important political influence for the removal of a long-standing friction between the two countries. The treaty, it is noticed, was concluded during the absence of Emperor William from Germany, and there is much speculation regarding the probable results upon the European alliance.

REACHING OUT.

London, Nov. 22.—The Birmingham Post says an agreement has been arrived at with the Congo Free State, "allowing the surveying of an African transcontinental line along the western shores of Lake Tanganyika and Albert Edward."

IMPERIALISM.

The Daily Mail, referring to Canada's contribution to the West Indies relief fund, says that it is an eloquent reminder of the duties due from the mother country and fostered by the spirit of imperialism. Canada's canal, the P. R. R., its confederation of provinces, its preferential trade law, naval reserve scheme—all these have been prompted by Canada's spirit of imperialism. And what is it, adds the Mail, but business-like imperialism that induces Lord Strathcona, of Canada, to confer with the government with reference to a Canadian fast steamship service. Historians will have much history about Canada's lead in imperialism.

A CRISIS.

London, Nov. 22.—The Berlin correspondent of the Daily News says something of a sensation has been caused there by the announcement in headed type in the semi-official North Gazette that Dr. Von Miquel, Russian minister of finance, instead of Prince Hohenlohe, the chancellor, presided over the cabinet council held yesterday (Monday). The Daily News correspondent says: "The fact that Prince Hohenlohe is in the best health and can be seen any day walking the streets gives some color to the rumor of a chancellor crisis."

THE KAISER AND HIS TRIP.

Berlin, Nov. 21.—Emperor William is expected to arrive here at the end of the week. It is said that in conversation at Messina he spoke optimistically of the situation.

PLAQUE RIOT IN INDIA.

London, Nov. 22.—A dispatch to the Times from Allahabad, capital of the northwest provinces of India, says: "A serious plague riot took place at Serlingapatam on Nov. 18. Ten thousand natives from the villages round about concentrated in Serlingapatam and made a desperate effort to enter the fort and rescue the prisoners there. Another mob from the Mysore side tried to rush the bridge. In each case the police fired volleys, and succeeded in frustrating the attempt. Many persons were killed or injured. For thirty-six hours the police were kept under arms. Utterly true, the riot was patched to the scene of the disturbance to be in readiness for any renewal."

CABLE NOTES.

Rev. Dr. Kane, rector of Christ Church, and Orange leader, is dead in Dublin, Ireland.

Anarchists are said to be responsible for an explosion in the Cafe de Champagne, Paris, in which a woman was killed and eight persons were seriously hurt.

The anniversary of the death of the "Manchester martyrs" was celebrated yesterday in Dublin and Cork, Ireland. In Dublin graves in Glasnevin Cemetery were decorated, and a procession marched through the streets headed by the Stars and Stripes and the French tricolor.

The Royal Geographical Society has issued a formal appeal for funds to fit out an Antarctic expedition. Alfred Harmsworth, proprietor of the Daily Mail and the Evening News, has offered £5,000.

Sir John Fowler, who was engineer-in-chief of the great Forth bridge, for which services he was created a baronet in 1890, is dead. He was born in 1847.

The Pekin correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, referring to the "precaution" of the danger of the selection of powers, says: "She recently dismissed an able minister, Huynmen, of the Tsung-Li-Yamen, at the request of Gen. Tung, because she feared a rebellion among the Kang Su troops of Tung."

At Shanghai on Monday, Prince Henry of Prussia unveiled the monument to the officers and sailors of the German third-class cruiser Illia, which was lost in a typhoon on July 23, 1896, north of the Shanghai promontory. A large force of German sailors and marines were present, with American, British and Austrian sailors.

FINAL OFFER TO THE DONS

False Report That Spanish-American Negotiations Had Ceased

Judge Day Submits the Final Proposition From Washington.

Spanish Commissioners Expect to Reply on Wednesday—Favorable Comments of London Newspapers on the Proposition—Rebellion in the Visayas Islands Suppressed.

Paris, Nov. 22.—The bulletin sent out yesterday, stating that "the president of the Spanish peace commission, Senor Montero Rios, had refused to continue the negotiations," was probably the work of stock jobbers.

The United States peace commissioners have undoubtedly made their final proposition here.

When the conference opened yesterday afternoon, Judge Day, addressing Senor Montero Rios and his colleagues of the Spanish commission, recurred to the protracted negotiations and reaffirmed the decision of the American commissioners to reach an amicable conclusion. Judge Day concluded his remarks by saying that the Americans, preferring not to break the armistice, or to resume hostilities, had determined to present another and final proposition, which he hoped would lead to a speedy and amicable adjustment. That portion of the presentation setting forth the new proposal—that the United States must have possession of the entire Philippine archipelago, with a tender of \$20,000,000 for a treaty cession of the islands—was then read.

Without betraying their mental attitude, the Spanish commissioners suggested an adjournment until Wednesday.

NO THIRD PARTY.

Spain's proposition to invoke the offices of a third power to construe the words, "control, disposition and government of the Philippines," was rejected by the American commissioners on the ground that the dictation of the third article of the protocol, dealing with the Philippines, is so broad and clear as to afford no justification for arbitration as between the parties to the agreement. In the event of cession, Spain may enjoy for a term of 12 years, rights of commerce in the Philippines equal to those of the United States. If the United States acquire the islands by conquest, Spain may not enjoy such rights. Should Spain refuse cession, she may remain liable to indemnity claims, national and individual, since the outbreak of the last Cuban insurrection. Should she refuse indemnity for expenses of the conquest, one of the Carolines, which she may now sell, and other privileges within Spanish jurisdiction might be taken with the United States without any return to Spain for them.

The Spaniards expect to reply at Wednesday's meeting.

THE LONDON PRESS.

London, Nov. 22.—The morning papers concede the generosity of the offers of the United States peace commissioners, and express the opinion that Spain would be foolish to reject them. They express universal gratification at the announcement of an "open door" policy in the Philippines. The Daily Mail calls the offer of \$20,000,000 an indemnity a surprising act of generosity. The papers generally take it for granted that the "open door" will be adopted in the West Indies also. The Daily News says: "The United States have now become an Asiatic power, and Lord Salisbury clearly has reason to predict that the expansion of the United States would give Great Britain a valuable ally in the China seas."

REBELLION SUPPRESSED.

The Madrid correspondent of the Daily Mail says: Gen. Rios, the Spanish governor of the Visayas Islands, cables from Iloilo that the rebellion of the native forces in the Spanish military service has been subdued. Ninety-seven rebels were court-martialed, of whom 25 were shot and 69 sentenced to imprisonment for life, with hard labor. The insurrection at Davao, on Mindanao Island, has been suppressed, according to Gen. Rios, and tranquility prevails in the rest of the islands, except Negros.

Passengers who arrived at Manila on Monday by the steamer Adelante report that the Spanish gunboats recently visited Sorsogon and fired three shells into the town, claiming that the insurgents there refused to lower their flag when ordered to do so. On the insurgents showing fight, is added, the gunboat left hurriedly. The shells did little damage.

SON OF A PEER

A Sensational Story About the Convict McWherrall.

Hamilton, Ont., Nov. 22.—Mrs. Truman, wife of Ramsome Truman, a printer, now living in New York, has been circulating a story to the effect that Walter MacWherrall, who was sentenced to life imprisonment five years ago for the murder of an old couple named Williams near Port Credit, is the son of a Scotch peer, and that she is his wife. The department of justice has been investigating her statements, and is now in communication with the firm of old country lawyers from whom Mrs. Truman received an annuity regularly. She gives MacWherrall the title of Viscount Fraser, son of Lord Malcolm, and is trying to have him liberated, as she says, in her Toronto home at the murder of the Williams.

Truman is known in New York for her excessive indulgence in liquors, and when the latter she frequents the city and new and startling like the above.
