MURDER SUSPECT SUICIDES
 Had Been Arrested in Connection With Minneapolis Hotel Crime.

Elroy, Wis., July 12.—Conductor N. M. Riggs, who was arrested here yesterday in connection with the murder of Millie Ellison at Minneapolis, shot himself early today, dying instantly. Riggs, when arrested, asked to be taken to see his wife and daughter who are visiting in the country. He returned last night and talked with many friends, being apparently cheerful, but somewhat pale. Shortly after midnight, Riggs asked permission to go to the hotel to his room. With the officer outside, and without locking the door, Riggs shot himself through the temple. When searched just after his arrest, Riggs had no weapon. Officers from Minneapolis were on their way here at the time of the suicide.

GALT STABBER CAUGHT
 Groves, Who Wounded West, Overtaken by the Police at Paris

Galt, July 11.—J. J. Groves, the gas fitter, who last night stabbed William West, hostler at the New Royal, was caught this morning by the chief of police of Paris, fourteen miles distant. He had footed it all the way, and when taken into custody was a badly frightened man.

He asked anxiously whether his victim was alive, and when told that he was he appeared much relieved.

Chief Gorman goes to Paris at three o'clock to bring Groves back. The charge preferred against him is of felonious wounding with intent to kill. The wounded man will be around in a few days.

HOT OVER LOCAL OPTION
 Upsetting of the Bylaw Rouses Sons of Temperance to Action.

Toronto, July 11.—The sixty-second convention of the National Division of America of the Sons of Temperance began here today, and members of this organization promise that there will be a hot time in the political pot over the temperance question in Ontario within the next few months by reason of the manner in which the law is being invoked to upset local option.

This body will make only a passing reference to it, as it is international in character, but a recommendation may be made to the Ontario division that meets in December, to take the matter up.

Most Worthy Patriarch Burgoyne, of St. Catharines, expressed regret that owing to the surrender of charters, there had been a net loss of 2,803 members during the past year. This leaves a total membership of 35,005.

TO PROTECT STEAMERS
 St. Lawrence Channel Will Be Deepened and 'Phones Tied of Fog.

Ottawa, July 11.—The Minister of Marine has given orders for the construction at Sorel this season of a powerful spoon dredge that is required to excavate the shale that underlies the St. Lawrence River at Cap a la Roche, between Quebec and Three Rivers. There is not more than 27-1-2 feet of water at low tide in the river at this point, and the larger vessels have to wait for high tide before passing it.

The dredge that the marine department intends building will be set to work next season, and will deepen the channel at Cap a la Roche to 30 feet, which is to be the minimum depth of the St. Lawrence up to Montreal with the works now in progress have been the cause of complaint.

As a further measure for the protection of shipping ascending and descending the St. Lawrence, it is intended to install a system of telephones which will be used in connection with wireless telegraphy to advise vessels of the presence of fog along the river. The presence of fog on the upper reaches of the channel between Montreal and Quebec has been responsible for more than one mishap. An instance last season was the accident to one of the Allan's new turbines.

Hon. Mr. Brodeur's plan is to place telephones at the principal stations, and have them report any fogs that may make their appearance along the more dangerous part of the river. Steamers passing up and down the river will then be able to govern their movements accordingly.

\$50,000 GEM ROBBERY
 Slick Pair Substitute Satchel for Th. Containing the Jewels

New York, July 11.—A man who described himself as James Stelman, an engineer, 24 years old, of Brooklyn, was arrested today on a charge of complicity in a \$50,000 diamond robbery, which occurred in London in March, 1905, according to the police, a man named Samuel Lockett is at present serving a five-year prison term in England in connection with the crime, having been arrested in Liverpool soon after the robbery took place. The victim was a salesman for a firm of French jewelers who was in London on behalf of his house. He carried sample diamonds and other jewels to the value of \$50,000 in a small hand-satchel. It is alleged by the police that Stelman and Lockett followed the salesman about, and one day, when he laid the satchel down they changed it for another similar in appearance.
