SIR ARTHUR CURRIE WANTS BRIGADE OF FRENCH-CANADIANS

Premier Enlightens Commons of General's Suggestion.

IDEA PLEASES QUEBEC

Would Reinforce Regiments Now Containing French-Canadians.

OTTAWA, May 14.—On the motion to go into committee of supply, P. R. Du Tremblay raised the question in the Commons this afternoon of the formation of French-Canadian brigades, commanded by officers speaking the French language. He said that this proposal had met with the approval of the French-Canadian people, the necessity of many of their people to speak the English language with any degree of fluency.

Mr. Du Tremblay said he did not desire to discuss the reasons why a French Canadian brigade was being formed, but that under the conscription act, French Canadians should be reinforced by men from Quebec until they were equal in number to the English-speaking men, that the command of the brigade when organized should be given to Col. Du Tremblay, the officer in charge of the 22nd Regiment.

The speaker criticized the Government for not having organized a school of officers in Quebec, and suggested that the school should be done in connection with the plan proposed. Another suggestion advanced by Mr. Du Tremblay was to divide the 22nd Regiment into four groups of 250 men, adding 750 new recruits to each group, making four complete battalions. The acceptance of his suggestion, he said, would cure certain misunderstandings in Quebec and give confidence to the people. In closing, he asked the prime minister to rise above any political considerations which might be made to him and grant the request.

Mr. Borden, in reply, said that the Government was in sympathy with the proposal and realized the force of the speaker's suggestion. He said that he was prepared to pay tribute to the splendid courage shown by French-Canadians in the war, but that at Courcellette had fought side by side with a regiment from his own province.

Request From Currie.

Sir Robert asked that while the Government, military considerations could be put aside, he should be permitted to call a cabaret to Sir Arthur Currie, who, in his reply, had suggested that regiments at the front containing French-Canadians should be reinforced from Quebec, so that gradually a French-Canadian brigade would be created.

Replying to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the minister, through the governor-general, announced in the House on May 14, that the plan proposed by Mr. Currie, may now be published.
