FOUR U. S. SOLDIERS KILLED BY I. W. W. DURING PARADE ALLIED REQUESTS ARE IGNORED IN RUMANIA'S REPLY

RUMANIA'S REPLY TO ENTENTE NOTE IS POLITE DEFIANCE OF SUPREME COUNCIL'S REQUEST

Answer of Rumanian Government Is Regarded As Wholly Unsatisfactory -- Rumanians Indicate a Willingness To Retire To River Theiss, But Decline To Respect Original Armistice Lines.

Paris, Nov. 12.—Rumania's reply to the Allied note recently presented, in which it was again demanded that Hungary be evacuated, is regarded as a polite defiance of the supreme council's request. The note, which was taken up for consideration by the supreme council this morning, was characterized as extremely evasive. The Rumanians indicate a willingness to retire to the River Theiss, but they decline to respect the original armistice lines and also decline to comply with the Allied request that they name a member of the inter-allied commission to compile the value of the goods seized in Hungary by the Rumanians so that this amount could be deducted from the total of the reparations due to Rumania. While the Rumanian note is worded in terms of extreme politeness, it is held to indicate continued defiance of the supreme council.

The council, during the morning's session, approved the report of the commission which had investigated conditions in Smyrna. Referring to the incidents which occurred during the landing of the Greek troops, which are declared to have been caused by lack of precautions on the part of the Greek military authorities.

The Greek authorities are asked to insure that order be maintained in the future, and that there be no recurrence of similar incidents. It is pointed out that the military occupation of Smyrna by the Greeks must be understood by them to be merely provisional.

MONTREAL LIQUOR DEALERS REFUSING CHECKS BECAUSE DEMANDS EXCEED SUPPLIES

Sad Surprise Is in Store For Many a Thirsty Individual in "Dry" Ontario--Shippers of "Liquid Refreshments" Are Virtually Inundated With Orders.

Montreal, Nov. 12.—Local shippers of alcoholic liquors are almost snowed under with orders from every point in Canada, following the announcement of new temperance legislation from Ottawa.

Anticipation that the present order-in-council, which prohibits the importation into dry provinces for personal use, and which went into effect April 1, 1918, will as a war measure, be automatically null and void when Canada officially signs the peace treaty, has produced a tremendous crop of orders.

A sad surprise is in store for the waiting thousands all over Canada. Montreal houses have not sufficient stock on hand to supply the demand, nor do they expect to be able to obtain sufficient supply until next summer.

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VICTORY LOAN NOW BEYOND \$400,000,000

Province of Ontario Has Subscribed Over Half This Amount.

QUEBEC IS SECOND

Many Cities and Districts Pass Their Objectives.

Toronto, Nov. 12.—When all the subscriptions to the Victory Loan up to noon today have been received it will be found that the four hundred million mark has been passed.

At noon today the amount was \$392,212,788. This was exclusive of reports for Monday and Tuesday from Alberta and New Brunswick, and for Tuesday from British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

The latest returns from the provinces are as follows: British Columbia, \$19,244,348; Alberta, \$3,361,000; Saskatchewan, \$7,825,050; Manitoba, \$21,364,800; Ontario, including Toronto, \$219,224,050; Quebec, including Montreal, \$96,355,810.

New Brunswick, \$6,320,650; Nova Scotia, \$12,466,100; Prince Edward Island, \$1,042,850; Toronto, up to noon today, reports \$30,480,500 in subscriptions, which includes \$170,000 contributed this morning. Montreal's total up to last night was \$77,283,900. Up to Monday night Victoria had reported \$4,119,580; Vancouver, \$8,112,400; Regina, \$1,825,900; Saskatoon, \$1,779,850; Winnipeg, \$11,268,400; Halifax, \$4,407,150; St. John's, \$1,113,500; Hamilton, \$12,277,590; London, \$8,808,350; Peterborough, \$2,069,800; Port William, \$1,150,750; and St. John, N. B., \$2,401,650.

CANADIAN SHORES SHOULD AT ALL TIMES BE PROTECTED BY SHIPS FROM BRITAIN'S NAVY

Viscount Jellicoe, in Address Before Canadian Club At Victoria, B. C., Declares Mother Country Must Realize the Necessity of Maintaining Squadrons in Colonial Waters.

Victoria, B. C., Nov. 12.—To my mind the British navy should not be kept short of overseas squadrons, I believe that the Empire as a whole realizes the imperative necessity of maintaining ships of war not only in home waters, but in close proximity to the most distant dominions. We must see to it that our overseas naval forces are again permitted to be as they were prior to the war. It is due to those gallant souls that were given to the Empire that we should not let such a condition should not exist again.

This declaration was made last night before the Canadian Club, Viscount Jellicoe summed up the lesson which the great admiral believed to be the most important of the war. He said that the British Commonwealth by the experiences of the war.

He asserted that the people of British Canada were justified in their anxiety during the early months of the war, knowing that Admiral von Spee's squadron was off the coast, and that the protection against them was inadequate. He held that the fears of other portions of the Empire, based on the same conditions, also were warranted. He contended that it was the plain duty of the Empire to see that preparedness on the sea in relation to the overseas dominions was no longer an issue to be toyed with.

"I know that Great Britain is hard up," he said, "I know that the dominions, too, are hard up, but I don't believe that the Empire will let such a condition should not exist again."

Drury Asks Kingston Man To Become the Attorney-General.

Toronto, Nov. 12.—Premier Drury announced that R. H. Grant, member-elect for Carleton, had accepted the portfolio of education in the Ontario Cabinet now being formed. Mr. Drury also stated that he had wired W. F. Nickle, K.C., of Kingston, offering him the portfolio of attorney-general.

Mr. Drury added that Mr. Nickle was expected in Toronto tonight and would then give him his final answer.

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STATE TROOPS PATROL STREETS OF CITY WHERE FOUR SOLDIERS WERE SHOT BY I. W. W. MEMBERS

Citizens of Centralia, Wash., Decide To Drive All Radicals From City--Soldiers Determined That "Red" Element Shall Leave--Feeling Runs High As Result of the Killing of Troopers--Mob Hangs One.

NINETEEN I. W. W. MEMBERS ARRESTED. Centralia, Wash., Nov. 12.—Nineteen alleged Industrial Workers of the World are in jail here today. The men were rounded up yesterday and last night after the firing on the Armistice Day parade, which resulted in the death of four members of the American Legion and the lynching of an I. W. W. member. There was no disorder here this morning.

Citizens today planned to drive all radicals from Centralia, where they have been increasing for some time. Centralia was headquarters for Lewis County Industrial Workers, operating from here into the logging camps and other industrial pursuits of this section. American Legion members expressed determination that every I. W. W. must leave the city.

One of twenty men arrested in the sweeping search for I. W. W.s following the attack was said to have confessed plans were made months ago to "get" Warren G. Brown, chairman of the I. W. W. in this section, and William Schabas and Capt. David Livingston. The four had been active in suppressing radical activities in this community.

The reason for the attack, which was held at the parade ground, was that I. W. W. headquarters today, had not been developed fully, but Herman Allen, an attorney, and member of a committee of former service men, and others co-operating with the authorities in an investigation, had been obtained that it was premeditated.
