REQUESTS ARE IGNORED IN RUMANIA'S REPLY

RUMANIA'S REPLY TO ENTENTE NOTE IS POLITE DEFIANCE OF SUPREME COUNCIL'S

Answer of Rumanian Government Is Regarded As Wholly Unsatisfactory - Rumanians Indicate a Willingness To Retire To River Theiss, But Decline To Respect Original Armistice Lines.

Paris, Nov. 12 .- Rumania's reply to the Allied note recently presented. in which it was again demanded that Hungary be evacuated, is regarded in peace conference circles as wholly unsatisfactory. The note, which was taken up for consideration by the supreme council this morning. was characterized as extremely evasive. The Rumanians indicate a willingness to retire to the River Theiss, but they decline to respect the original armistice lines and also decline to comply with the Allied request that they name a member of the inter-allied commission to compile the value of the goods seized in Hungary by the Rumanians so that this amount could be deducted from the total of the reparations due to Rumania. While the Rumanian note is worded in terms of extreme politeness, it is held to indicate continued defiance of the supreme

The council, during the morning's session, approved the report of the commission which had investigated conditions in Smyrna. Referring to the incidents which occurred during the landing of the Greek troops, which are declared to have been caused by lack of precautions on the part of the Greek military authorities.

The Greek authorities are asked to insure that order be maintained the future, and that there be no recurrence of similar incidents. It is pointed out that the military occupation of Smyrna by the Greeks must e understood by them to be merely provisional.

CANADA'S MINISTER OF LABOR FIGHTING **INSURANCE CLAUSE**

The Unemployment Insurance Scheme Could Not Be Extended To All.

TOO MANY FOREIGNERS

Adoption of Plan Outlined At Labor Conference Would Be Financial Drain

Washington, D. C., Nov. 12 .- Canada is putting up a keen fight against obligatory provisions in the draft convenligatory provisions in the draft convention on unemployment now before the International Labor Conference. The clause to which exception is taken by the Canadian delegation refers to re-ciprocity in unemployment insurance, it provides that "states signatory of this convention which have established system of unemployment insurance shall make arrangements whereby were belonging to one such state." workers belonging to one such state and employed by another shall be ad-mitted to the benefits of such insurance upon terms to be agreed upon between the states concerned." Canada takes the position that there should be no obligation to extend the benefits of unemployment insurance to the workers of any other country, that the workers of any other country, that clause should be optional. Italians Building Gigantic Dirigible To Cross Atlantic

Airship Will Be Capable of Britain's Trade in Foreign Traveling 3,125 Miles Without Refloating.

Rome, Monday. Nov. 11.-The airdrome at Ciampino, near Rome, is busy building a new dirigible destined to cross the Atlantic Ocean. The airship, it is said, will be capable of traveling 3.125 miles without refloating. The frame of the ship comprises a hollow steel beam executing from the prov the stern. This beam, according to description, will take the place of usual passenger carriage, and will be able to accommodate 150 passengers.

Sir George Clerk, the Allied emissary, has delivered, on behalf of the supreme council, it is stated, an ultimatum to Premier Friedrich, notifying him that a coalition cabinet must be formed within 48 hours or that he must retire from the premiership.

Markets Increased as Home **Production Shows Revival**

American Chamber of Commerce in British Capital Presents Good Report On Conditions Throughout the United dealers. Kingdom-"Business League of Nations" Is Planned.

London, Nov. 12 .- The Armerican Chamber of Commerce in London, in its report for October, notes a gradual revival of trade in British foreign markets, particularly as strikes continue to cripple America's export trade.

According to a leading London bank, the chamber's report says Great Britain's "invisible exports." consisting of returns from foreign investment, etc., are estimated at almost \$3,000,000,000 for 1919, as compared with less than \$2,000,000,000 in 1913.
