So the plano queen took her place in the orchestra pit and doled out sentimental, melodious chords when the heroine appeared. The villain was ushered in with ominous therms in a true melodramatic. themes, in a true melo-dramatic fashion, while an engaging theme, played in rapidly accelerated time, announced the arrival of the hero to save the heroine from all harm.
