THE FEATURE AT CHICAGO IS THE STRENGTH OF CORN

Wheat and Oats Lower at Chicago, Corn Higher Again—Liverpool Prices Are Up.

Friday Evening, July 10. Liverpool wheat futures closed today 1/4 to 1/2 higher than yesterday, and corn futures 1/4 to 1/2 higher. At Chicago, July wheat closed 1/4 lower than yesterday, July corn 1/4 higher, and July oats 1/4 lower. Winnipeg car lots today, 71 year ago, 12. Chicago car lots today: Wheat, 23; corn, 10; oats, 14. Oats, 14. Argentine shipments of wheat and corn this week, 2,022,000, 1,738,000; last week, 2,264,000, 2,429,000; last year, 1,892,000, 1,755,000. Visible Argentine wheat and corn, 1,420,000, 1,468,000; last week, 1,440,000, 1,755,000; last year, 1,472,000, 1,755,000. Modern Miller notes some deterioration as a result of rains in winter wheat belt, and says farmers are inclined to hold wheat at present prices. The state agricultural department of Michigan makes a very favorable report on crop condition in that district. The department estimates an expected yield of 16 bushels per acre, as compared to 14 last year, and the quality of winter wheat is excellent. The condition of the corn crop is placed at 85, as compared with 84 a year ago.

PARDON 18 YEARS LATE. Release From Year Sentence Signed by President Harrison Last Arrives. COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 10.—Eighteen years after George Swanson completed his one-year sentence in the penitentiary for violating the United States pension laws, having been sent up from Youngstown, a full and complete pardon arrived at the institution to-day, signed by Benjamin Harrison, then president of the United States, and Wm. F. Harton, his acting secretary of War. The original letter containing the pardon was received here yesterday from St. Louis. It is dated at Washington, Sept. 3, 1890. It was stamped at Columbus, Sept. 4. It is probable that the letter has been lying in some postoffice for years.

SCARCITY OF OFFERINGS FEATURE OF THE MARKETS

Markets for Cobalt Stocks Are Quite Buoyant—Little Stock Offering at Advances.

World Office. Friday Evening, July 10. Cobalt markets had a buoyant undertone to-day, and only that outside purchases were small prices must have advanced materially higher than they did. To-day's buying was very limited, but the floating supply of stock was so limited that advances in prices were easily forced. The strength in the market was general, but interest centered chiefly in Thretheway, Temiskaming and Silver Leaf. A good deal of to-day's purchases of Thretheway came from Cobalt, and was occasioned by the new vein discovered on the company's property. Silver Leaf and Temiskaming were bought both for investment and speculation. Crown Reserve was wanted in Montreal, and little of the stock was offered in this market. La Rose was heavily bought at \$2.50 a share, and a much better all round enquiry for other stocks was reported from that centre. At the close of the exchange here the strength as it appeared to speculators was the small amount of stocks now offering, even at advancing quotations.
