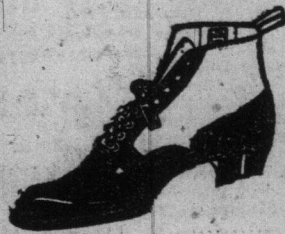

### WANT THROAT INSPECTOR.

Management Committee Passes Motion  
Submitted by Dr. Ogden.

"That a third inspector be appointed to inspect such public school classes as may be assigned to him and to supervise high schools and make such reports regarding them as may be required by the board of education in conformity with the regulations of the education department."

Trustee Ogden's motion as above was passed at the meeting of the management committee of the board of education yesterday afternoon. It came as an amendment to a motion by Trustee Houston to have the high schools made mutually independent of each other, with the principal of each given full permission to use the limit the powers vested in him by the education department.

Only Trustee Leves supported Trustee Martin's motion to have supervisors abolished.

The little difference of opinion between Dr. Hawke and Superintendent Kierulff of Mimico Industrial School was patched up. Mr. Ferrier explained that in allowing Mrs. Brennan to teach as an "occasional," he had acted under permission of Dr. Ogden.

W. J. Gage, on behalf of the National Sanitarium Association, and Toronto Free Hospital for Consumptives, obtained permission to have "red cross" stamps introduced into the schools, the proceeds to go to the institutions.
