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KELLY STARTED THE FIGHT THAT ENDED IN HIS DEATH

Skull Fractured, But He Had No Medical Aid—Smith Brothers Sent For Trial.

BARRIE, June 30.—(Special.)—While Wm. and James Smith of Floss Township were to-day committed by a magistrate to stand trial for the murder of Michael Kelly, this charge will be reduced to manslaughter. The brothers were locked up in Barrie jail to-night, but they will be released when they provide bail of \$250 each.

Mrs. Kelly, who gave her evidence with no sign of distress, declared that her husband had been at the back door when the Smiths drove up the road about 5.30 Sunday night.

LEAVE GRANTED TO TAKE CASE TO FOOT OF THRONE

Twelve Judges Against Two So Far Have Decided For Powassan Lumber Company.

A cable was received in the city yesterday announcing that the privy council had granted special leave to appeal from the judgment of the supreme court of Canada in the case of McClellan v. Powassan Lumber Co. In this case 12 judges have decided against the plaintiff, and two, Mr. Justice Mabee and the trial judge, in her favor.

DR. POLLARD ON BAIL

Court of Appeal Quashes Conviction by Trial Court.

Dr. Stephen B. Pollard and Mrs. Mary Tinsley, convicted at the sessions of performing an abortion on Annie Jones, will be tried again in September. The court of appeal yesterday quashed their conviction on the grounds that irrelevant evidence had been admitted at the trial by Judge Winchester in the testimony of a man and his wife who swore that an abortion had been performed by Pollard upon the woman nine months before the trial.

PELLATT RAMS FERRY

HANLAN CUT IN TWAINE

Huge Ironclad Out of Control Making Berth in Bay Street Slip.

The little steamer John Hanlan, owned and operated by the Toronto Ferry Company between the city wharf and Centre Island, was rammed yesterday morning by the steamer H. M. Pellatt of the Ocean & Lakes Navigation Company's fleet at the Bay-street slip, and now lies on her starboard side on the bottom in about 12 feet of water.

HORSE PARADE TO-DAY

Six Hundred Entries For Dominion Day Event.

The principal event this morning will be the seventh annual parade of the Toronto Open Air Horse Parade Association. Upwards of 600 entries have been received, or nearly 100 more than any previous year.

DAKOTA TORNADOES

GRAND FORKS, N.D., June 30.—Scores of people were injured and 25 farm buildings within a radius of six or seven square miles were destroyed as a result of a series of tornadoes in Benson County.

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The accident happened at 5.30 o'clock while the Hanlan was tied up at the slip. No persons were on board the Hanlan and no personal injuries resulted from the mishap.

Directors of the Ferry Company residing in Buffalo will arrive in the city to-day and a meeting will be held between the two steamship companies concerned and the insurers of the Pellatt with a view to settling the damage.
