

The budget for two years will be concentrated into one and then, if the lords reject the veto bill, the King will be asked to create enough peers to carry it. The King probably will refuse and then Asquith either will resign or demand another dissolution some time in July.

If that election be again favorable to the Liberals, the King will give his guarantee and the veto bill will pass. Fight to Be to Finish.

Fight to Be to Finish. If the Liberals are defeated the bill will be shelved by the Tory govern-ment, who may propose instead a re-formed house of Jords, partly on an electorate basis. But the Liberals will refuse all compromise and the fight to extinguish the veto power of the lords will remain the decisive issue in Brit-ish politics till it is settled.

Redmond's bold policy is rallying the Radical opinion, and is stifling factionism in Ireland, and if successful Ireland will turn one of the sharpest and worst corners she has had to face for a long time. The spirit in Ire-iand is excellent and the movement is greatly encouraged by the fighting temper produced among the loyal Na-tionalists by O'Brien and his faction.
