

## PLAINTIFF HELPED TO SECURE ORDERS

Deputy Director of Munitions Says Carr-Harris Instrumental in Getting Order.

The evidence in the action against the Canadian General Electric Company by R. R. Carr-Harris for some \$43,000, was continued yesterday. Major-General Sir Edouard Percy Cranwell Givard testified in the English high court to having seen Mr. Carr-Harris about August, 1915. The visit was, so far as Gen. Givard could recall, purely personal, nothing with regard to the securing of orders being mentioned.

William L. Hutchins, who came to Canada to succeed Lord Rhonda in 1915, stated that the shell committee had given the Canadian General Electric Company such orders as were desirable.

**Did Not Recall Order.**  
Sir Frederick Black, director general of munitions supply, during August, 1915, recalled an interview with Mr. Carr-Harris about the end of the month, when Mr. Milne accompanied Mr. Carr-Harris. He recalled a memorandum, stating that he had informed Mr. Milne and Mr. Carr-Harris that it was not the policy of the ministry of munitions to make orders in London for execution in Canada, but that business would be done through the shell committee of Canada. He had no recollection of orders given by the Canadian General Electric Company. He said that any arrangements that were made were effected after the interview.

**Carr-Harris Instrumental.**  
George Macaulay Booth, deputy director of munitions, said that he had given Mr. Carr-Harris and Mr. Milne to understand that there was no question of placing orders with them. Requests for orders had come through Col. Nicholls. Mr. Booth stated that Mr. Carr-Harris had been a contributing factor in the securing of certain orders.

## SOLD TIMBER LAND WITHOUT TENDERS

Large Tracts Disposed of Without Offering for Sale by Public Tender.

The outstanding fact brought out in yesterday's continuation of the timber limits probe was that extensive limits had been granted to individuals and private companies by the department of lands and forests without first offering these tracts for sale by public tender, a statement in full will be issued today. One tract covered an area of 85 square miles.

**Discrepancy in Reports.**  
John A. Ferguson, an Arnold & Bell superintendent, resumed his position in the witness box. He was examined by T. R. Harding, senior crown counsel. Referring to Tuesday's evidence, Mr. Harding inquired how it was possible that for every foot of lumber reported to the government as cut, the mill records show that in reality three feet were cut. Mr. Ferguson replied that such discrepancies are not uncommon in the mills, are not reported to the government.

Mr. Ferguson stated that they "had made the most of" the exploitation of the timber limits. He told of a scheme whereby 5 per cent. was deducted from the shanty books because the log makers reported more logs daily than the cutter's report showed.

## TWO OF SAME NAME LIVE ON SAME STREET

Much annoyance has been caused to Mrs. Ellen Ryan of 233 Bathurst street by an item in the issue of Tuesday morning last, in which a Mrs. Ellen Ryan of Bathurst was reported as having been arrested under the O. T. A. It is an unfortunate coincidence that two Mrs. Ellen Ryans reside on the same street—one, our complainant, an old and respected resident of Toronto, and the other Mrs. Ryan, 86 Bathurst street, a newcomer, against whom the charge was laid.

## OBJECT TO CLOSING OF SOLDIERS' HALL

A message has been sent to Sir James Loughheed of the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment at Ottawa by Mayor Church, protesting against the proposal to close Euclid Hall for incurables and move the soldier inmates to Brant House, near Hamilton. He asked for a conference before action is taken. Euclid Hall is located at the corner of Jarvis and Wellesley streets, and has housed incurable soldiers during the past two years.

## CITY'S OPTION EXPIRES ON HOSPITAL PROPERTY.

The city's option on the old general hospital, on East Gerrard street, has expired and it is understood that the property will now be sold by the general hospital board to a real estate firm, who will raise the buildings and divide the property into building lots.

Dr. Hastings, M.H.O., was anxious to get this property for an isolation hospital, and the board of health had an option on the property of \$12,500 and was to assume a mortgage of \$25,000, making \$15,000 in all. The consideration of the sale of the property to the real estate firm is said to be \$225,000.

## REPRIEVE TO COPPEN REFUSED.

Justice Latchford, who presided at the trial of George Coppen, has refused to grant a reprieve in order to allow an application to the minister of justice at Ottawa to commute the death sentence. Mr. Gibson informed the minister of justice that a reprieve had been refused and filed an application for executive clemency.

## VETERANS' PROTEST HEARD BY COUNCIL

City Officials Will Confer on Giving Returned Men Appointments.

Mayor Church and the city council received a deputation of returned men yesterday morning at the city hall. The council's attention was directed to the feeling among veterans that they had not been given proper consideration when civic appointments were being made. The spokesmen protested that when vacancies occur, the positions should be advertised in order to enable returned men to submit their applications and state their qualifications.

About 200 veterans were present. They ranged themselves in the lobby and corridors and on the stairs off the main entrance of the city hall. The council received the deputation in the main hall, where they were met by the mayor.

The mayor expressed appreciation of the manner in which the veterans had presented their case, and stated that the matter of civic appointments would be thoroughly looked into. He further stated that a conference of the heads of the various departments would be called and instructions issued that returned men, with necessary qualifications, are to be given the preference in future when vacancies occur.

Probate to the will of Emma Louisa Muntz, who died February 13, leaving \$8,435, has been granted.

Thomas George Croft, a retired carpenter, who died January 81, left \$4,655. Lieut. Henry Lloyd Hammond, Royal Air Force, who was reported killed December 24 last, left a cash account of \$508. The widow, Roseline Hammond, is the sole beneficiary.
