**FLOATING THE G.T.P.**

Speyer Bros. Issue Announcement in the Wall Street Journal.

New York, Nov. 29.—(Special.)—Details of the Grand Trunk Pacific project are announced in connection with the financing of the road by Speyer Bros. The following announcement will be made in the Wall Street Journal to-morrow.

The road is to be built in two divisions, the eastern from Montreal, N.B., to Winnipeg, 1800 miles, and the western from Winnipeg to the Pacific, 1500 miles. 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**FIREMEN AGAIN BLAMED**

BY FIRE UNDERWRITERS

Loss in Flett-Lowndes Fire Reaches \$35,000—Chief Thompson's Reply.

The damage to the stocks by water in the Flett-Lowndes Co. building is much larger than was at first supposed. The firms interested now claim that it will take \$35,000 to cover their losses. The wholesale men and underwriters are censuring the fire brigade for the lack of knowledge shown by the men in not knowing how to turn off the valves and stopping the deluge from the sprinklers.

Mr. C. B. Lowndes, secretary of the Flett-Lowndes Syndicate, said yesterday:

"I consider the situation of things is disgraceful, and that the system of inspection in vogue should be investigated. The firemen closed the wrong valves that shut off the supply of water to the outside water curtain, so that if the building had taken fire this would have been useless. It is shameful that lack of knowledge on the part of the firemen has caused such great damage."

**Men Should Have Known.**

It is claimed by the insurance men that the department should have been familiar with the working of the sprinkling system, as Eaton, Killgour, Simpson and many other houses had the same in use. All the firemen had to do was to follow the line of pipes and reach the valves.

The fire underwriters met to consider the loss and distribution of the losses. The insurance on the Atlas, Aetna, Western, Home National, Illinois, Quebec, Phoenix, Royal, Mercantile, Hartford, Flett-Lowndes Co., \$80,000 in the Queen, Northern, Connecticut, Alliance and Anglo-American.

**Chief Thompson Replies.**

Chief Thompson is not greatly exercised over the efforts being made in some quarters to blame upon the fire department for the loss caused by stock in the Flett-Lowndes building by a sprinkler that did its work only too conscientiously.

About a year ago he made out a list of all the buildings in the city that called upon him at the department's hands. The building in question was put up since that time, and he received no inquiry from the company that it was insured.

On one point in particular Chief Thompson is very emphatic, and that is, that even had the firemen been notified how to go to work and shut off the valve the damage would already have been done. The men were under extreme difficulty. The smoke was so dense that it was practically impossible to see, even when close to the floor, while the valve for which they were hunting was situated near the ceiling of an apartment far back in the building from the one in which the fire originated. Further, the chief says that there were two employees of the company on the scene all the time who were unable to give any information.
