The increased water rate on city churches is to be opposed at a meeting called in the board of trade rooms Tuesday evening next of representatives of the various churches. The claim made is that the present rate is excessive.

FRANK ROGERS IS A NICE SPECIMEN

Man Arrested for Lurking in North End Barn Abandoned His Wife and Child in Amherst.

It has been definitely decided that Frank Rogers, the illustrated song singer now in jail awaiting sentence for assaulting a girl and also lying and lurking in a barn on the Shamrock grounds, was married in Amherst last winter to an Amherst young woman, while he was singing at the Palace Theatre there under the management of Samuel J. Ritchey of St. John.

Recently his wife has given birth to a child and Rogers has abandoned both wife and baby, leaving them in Amherst entirely dependent on the benevolence of relatives.

Yesterday the clergyman who tied the knot presented permission from Judge Ritchey and visited Rogers in jail for the purpose, as he expressed it, of having a chat with him.

This morning Rogers was again escorted to the courtroom and remanded for three days. S. J. Ritchey and Judge Ritchey both conversed with him privately at some length.

It will not be a surprise if the man is arraigned for perjury as it is gleaned that the police are without clamor obtaining proof of their allegations which, under oath, Rogers emphatically asserted were false.

BOYS IN SHOOTING GALLERIES

The shooting galleries, which have in such a brief time, become so numerous, are now the bane of a parent's existence, and for the moment the pool rooms have been relegated to the background. On Mill street three of these resorts are located, one each on Brussels and Waterloo and one on King street. Evidently the proprietors of the majority of the galleries are catering particularly to juvenile patrons. Every night boys of tender ages congregate in the galleries and usually remain very late, either shooting or playing the practice. That the fact has the boys in a vice-like grip is evidenced by the numbers who frequent these places.
