### MONTREAL COMMENT ON STOCK MARKET

Sentiment Not Much Affected by Movement in New York—  
The Local Market Without Any Sensations Last Week.

(Montreal Witness.)

The boom in United States specialties during this week did not influence this market one way or another. The price improvements on the greater market were much too spasmodic to inspire confidence in the continuation of the movement, and it is very likely that traders at this point who were not directly interested in the New York stocks preferred to await a more healthy looking market than that of Wall street at the present time. Rather than accompany the price development in London and New York, the local market fell off toward a lower level and many stocks weakened considerably. The volume of business was not heavy, but the aggregate amount of stocks that came out during the week showed a desire on the part of operators to liquidate. It is thought in some quarters that the large American insurance companies have taken this opportunity of higher prices to sell out the over-plus of stocks that has been held by them, according to their ruling of the Armstrong committee. The insurance companies have five years in which to sell their stock holdings, but it is pretty safe to assume that they will liquidate on every favorable occasion, so as not to be caught napping at the eleventh hour. The market in New York has every semblance of unwholesomeness, and it is distinctly satisfactory to note that the public, after the first flutter, less than a week ago, has quietly got out. Whether or not it is due to advanced education, or an active individual commercial life among the masses of this continent, and also of Great Britain, there is a marked falling off in the speculative appetite of the man in the street, far, at least, as stock

### NOVA SCOTIA STEEL AND COAL

Will Shortly Pay a Five Per Cent. Dividend on Common Stock.

(Montreal Witness.)

A witness representative was informed this morning of the decision of the directors of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company to pay, at an early date, a five per cent dividend on the common stock of that company. Not since 1903, has a dividend been paid on this stock, and since that time manipulators have created such a speculative atmosphere around the stock that only the most cautious investors dare touch it with any reasonable chance of success. The announcement, however, will come as a great surprise, but it will be a welcome one and should help this market to a very great extent. The stock sold down a fraction this morning and at the prevailing selling price of today there should be a return on the investment of 7.2 per cent. The profits for 1905 represented about 10 per cent earned on the common stock, so there should be, considering the greatly increased business this year, a large margin over and above the 5 per cent dividend payment. On the capital stock of \$5,000,000, the dividend requirements would be \$250,000, and as a matter of fact the company has nearly doubled the idea of a dividend payment does not appear so preposterous as at first glance. Further particulars on another page state the output of the plant has nearly doubled during the present season.

The output of the mines this season surpassed all expectations. According to an official statement issued on August 15 last not less than 67,000 tons of coal have been carried from North Sydney to St. Lawrence ports since the opening of navigation, as against 37,500 tons for the corresponding period last year. The company has at work a fleet of twelve vessels, and this will be considerably increased by next season.

### THE PRESENT REVOLT IN CUBA

The Cuban revolt has been smoldering since the election last spring, when President Palma was re-elected after a bitter campaign, in which blood was shed, and in which the inviolability of the 1812 box was totally disregarded in many interior towns, centres of plantation districts, where the proprietors tried hard to break the power of the government.

The reason for their action was the cause of the revolution—the desire to force free trade relations with the United States, even to the extent of annexation, if the desired end could be obtained in no other way.

General Jose Miguel Gomez, a veteran of the many wars that ended in Cuba's independence was Palma's opponent at the elections.

Palma, who as a civilian statesman, had other ideas than Gomez, who stated on many occasions that he wished to see the island develop all her natural resources, and claimed that the only way to do it was to open the doors to the trade of the universe.

Palma, whose ideas of Cuban transcendence were more exalted, has tried to put Cuba on the plane of the great nations, with trade treaties and customs houses at every port.

No standing army of size has been maintained in Cuba by the government, which has always consisted of citizens.

Gomez for long has been secretly preparing for a struggle to depose the civilian arm, and make the island able to master an army for peace or war.

Five weeks ago Palma's government began political arrests of leaders of the insurrection. He also put a stop to the persecution of Americans on the Isle of Pines, off the southwestern coast, where the revolutionists were trying to create feeling in the United States against the Cuban government. But President Palma's efforts have been in vain.

Gomez has been placing the island and has aroused the great mass of the people, who are laborers, to the advantage that would accrue from American dependence, chief of which was an increase of wages.

The revolutionists have even gone so far as to place their placards on the walls of the principal streets of Havana, and within the last week have brought matters to a head.
